LANE COUNTY HOGS BRING HIGHEST PRICES

100 Head, Sold Through Pomona Grange Market Master Last Week, Bring \$2068.

The 100 head of hogs marketed by W. A. Ayres, assistant market master of the Lane County Pomona grange, in Portland during the latter part of last week, netted the farmers who made the shipment the sum of \$2068, the largest sum received since the co-operative marketing plan was established more than a year ago.

Lane county hogs brought the highest price of any in the market this season up to Friday night, according to Mr. Ayres. For 25 of them in this shipment the price of \$10.35 a hundred pounds was paid. This is five cents higher than anyone else received during the week. Fifty-seven of them brought \$10.25 a

hundred, and 17 brought only \$9.87.

It is expected that weekly shipments will be made by the market committee all winter and spring, according to Mr. Ayres. A second shipment was made Tuesday.

The top price brought by the Lane county hogs was the highest since 1915 when at one time the market reached \$11 in Portland. There are indications that this figure will be equalled or exceeded this year.
