DRUGGISTS CAUTIONED BY DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Letters Warns That Patent Medicines May Be Considered Beverages By Jury

Druggists of Lane county have been warned by district attorney L. L. Ray in regard to selling certain patent medicines and bitters which contain much alcohol. In view of the restrictions placed upon the sale of alcohol by the "bone dry" law, the district attorney urges the dealers to be careful along this line. He has sent out a circular letter to the druggists, reading as follows:

"I have had several inquiries as to the law in regard to the sale of bitters and other preparations sold as drugs and sometimes used for intoxicating beverages. That there may be no question in your mind as to what the law in this matter is, and because of the importance which the sale of such articles is about to assume as a result of the operation of the 'bone dry' law, I am sending out this circular letter to the druggists of Lane county.

"It is a matter of common knowledge that several varieties of medicines, cordials, tonics, bitters, and the like, which are not found in the United States dispensatory or other like standard authorities, containing a large portion of alcohol are being sold and generally used for intoxicating beverages. The sale of these articles is not specifically covered by our present prohibitory law, Chapter 141 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1915, and neither will they be specifically covered by the 'Bone Dry' amendment to that law, however they are covered by implication of each of these laws, and under the law of 1915 a number of convictions have been secured in different counties in this state for selling such articles.

"As to whether or not the sale of such goods is a violation of the prohibitory liquor law is in all cases a question of fact to be determined by the jury. In such cases the test to determine the nature of the article is not the presence or amount of alcohol, but the adaptability of the substance for use as a medicine or a beverage. That is, if the article may be used as an intoxicating beverage, notwithstanding the other ingredients, it comes within the definition of intoxicating liquor in our prohibitory act, but on the other hand if it cannot be so used, if the other ingredients are medicinal and the alcohol is necessary preservative or vehicle, then the sale is lawful. But this is a fact to be ascertained by evidence and passed upon by the jury. (Black on intoxicating liquor, Sections 8 to 11; State vs. Miller, et al, 92 Kan, 994; 142 Page 974).

"In order that there be no trouble or misunderstanding over this matter I would advise that you arrange your sales so that they will come within the interpretation of the law."

County Clerk Submits Annual Report of His Office for the Year.

Together with the semi-annual report of the county officers, now being published, the county clerk yesterday submitted an annual report of his office, showing the entire amount of warrants drawn on the county treasurer during the year 1916 and the amounts received.

The report shows that a total of \$281,181.84 was expended by the county during the year and the sum of \$370,361.35, which includes over \$36,000 cash on hand at the first of the year and over \$10,000 transferred from state tax fund and armory fund, was received.
