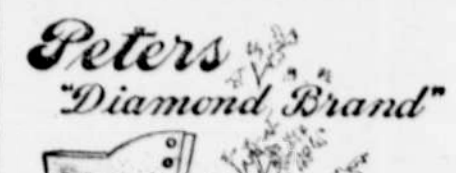

ALL PROPERTY SHOULD BE ASSESSED AT CASH VALUE

Assessor Burton Receives Instructions From State Tax Commission.

Assessor D. P. Burton has received a letter from the state tax commission regarding the requirements of the law and calling upon him to assess all taxable property in Lane county at its full cash value. The letter says in part:

"Allowance must be made for the problems and difficulties the assessor encounters in seeking to apply the standard of valuation to particular classes of property. At the same time there is no justification for known and intentional violations of the letter of the law. The nearer the assessor comes to the full cash value in all his assessments, the fairer and more equitable will the assessments become as between the individual taxpayers. Deliberate undervaluation of property always tends toward inequality and injustice in taxation."

"The time-worn statement that increased valuations result in increased taxes on account of rates of levy not being correspondingly reduced, has been negated by budget laws, by the tax limitation amendment to the constitution and, particularly, by a recent enactment requiring that all tax levies shall hereafter be made in dollars. Under the plan of equalization between counties now in effect, it is no longer true that a high county valuation increases and a low valuation reduces the proportion of state taxes to be paid by any county."

"The tax commission does not attempt to prescribe a hard and fast rule for assessment, but insists that each assessor shall make an earnest effort to obey the law and record such assessment so that he can take the required oath without subterfuge or mental reservation."

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LANE IS CAPTURED BY NESMITH COUNTY

Oregon Voter: If the mountain will not come to Mahomet, Mahomet will go to the mountain.

Thus it is in the classic county of Lane, with its State University and Cottage Grove.

Since the memory of mere men runneth not to the contrary, Cottage Grove has been trying to split Lane County, so Cottage Grove could have a county seat. Eugene, the present county seat, feebly objected, with the result that Cottage Grove has not been able to split the county and move a county seat to Cottage Grove. But it has done the Mahomet stunt, for it has moved its citizens to Eugene to hold down the salaried county offices, warm the court-house chairs and repose their toothless vices on the court-house mahogany.

At the last election, Cottage Grove captured every county office for which it had a candidate, and it had a candidate for every office that was open. Result, Cottage Grove has moved to the county throne, even if it couldn't erect its own throne within its own mural limits. District attorney, assessor, county clerk, sheriff, county treasurer, school superintendent, surveyor and even cor-

oner are all present or recent residents of Cottage Grove. What does Cottage Grove want of a county seat, anyhow?

The Voter puts it a little strong, but the assessor, county clerk, coroner, district attorney and county commissioner were either elected from Cottage Grove or were former residents. The retiring assessor and retiring assistant district attorney were also former residents. All the new faces in the court house this year are from the future county seat of Nesmith county.

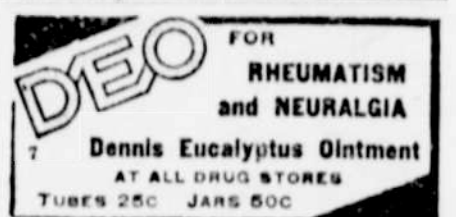
