SQUIRE J. W. VAUGHN PASSES BEYOND

Long, Eventful and Useful Life of 94 Years Comes to End in Early Hours This Morning.

Sixty-seven years a Mason, 46 years a justice of the peace, a pioneer of 1853, and the son of a mother who lived to the age of 105 years, Squire J. W. Vaughn, one of the best known of Cottage Grove citizens, died early this morning in his ninety-fifth year.

The squire had remarkable vitality and retained his mental faculties in a remarkable degree until his last illness. Only a few months ago he attended a Masonic lodge meeting in honor of the

older members of the fraternity and made quite a remarkable speech.

Funeral arrangements have not been made as yet.

As justice of the peace the judge probably united more loving hearts than any other man in the county. Fully 300 couples received marriage certificates bearing his signature.

Mr. Vaughn served one year as county commissioner before becoming a justice and was well known in the early days here as the owner of a burr mill on Row river about two miles from here, the site being now a part of the well known Spray farm.

In 1853, as a man of 31, Mr. Vaughn joined a train that left Keokuk, Iowa, for Oregon. All went well with the party until the Harney lake country was reached, where the trail was lost, the party wandering around for two weeks.

All that time they were almost without food. They had neither flour, salt, tea, coffee, nor sugar, and were compelled to butcher some of the faithful cattle that had been their companions for three months across the burning plains.

Nothing but this tough, unsalted meat had they as means of sustenance for a month. Finally picking up the trail again the Des Chutes country was reached, where the party again became lost.

Reaching the Willamette at last the party settled at Cloverdale, where Mr. Vaughn ran a flour mill for six years previous to erecting his Row river mill. This latter he moved in 1883 to Latham, retiring from business in 1894.

Judge Vaughn was twice wedded. The first ceremony was performed at Keokuk, Iowa, in 1853, the bride being Miss Mathebe Orlene Daniels. The second ceremony was performed at Cottage Grove in 1868, the bride being Miss Sins Alexander, who survives.

Surviving children are S. H. Vaughn, Cottage Grove; A. B. Vaughn, Baker City; E. W. Vaughn, Oakland, Calif.; O. M. Vaughn, Oakland, Calif.; Mrs. C. D. Emerson, Dundee, Ore.; Mrs. Roy Baker, Dundee, Ore.; Mrs. E. M. Cruse, Cottage Grove; Miss Leona Vaughn, Cottage Grove. There are a number of grandchildren.
