RAILWAY MEN CALL OFF BIG STRIKE

Managers of Railroads Reach Decision to Put Basic Eight-Hour Day Into Effect.

New York—The conference committee of railroad managers early Monday morning authorized President Wilson's mediators to make whatever arrangements were necessary with the railroad brotherhoods to call off the threatened strike.

Immediately after Secretary Lane had made his announcement the brotherhood leaders sent telegrams to all the general chairmen informing them that the strike had been called off.

The decision reached by the managers at their midnight conference means that the brotherhood have won an important victory, although it does not bring them all their original demands. By the agreement, it is assumed they will be awarded pro rata time for overtime on the basic eight-hour day, which they have been assured.

Their original demands called for time and a half for overtime on the same basic day.

Ernest appeals by Secretary Lane and the other mediators to the patriotism of the railroad managers are believed to have been an important factor in bringing about a settlement. Similar pressure was brought to bear on the brotherhood chiefs.

SPECIAL SESSION OF SENATE ADJOURNS

Washington—The special senate session, which began March 5, adjourned sine die after confirming most of the 1400 nominations which failed at the last session, and failing to ratify the \$25,000,000 Colombian treaty.

The session just closed was the first of its kind in many years which was not called on to confirm a cabinet nomination. President Wilson decided that all of the members of his official family could be retained without the formality of renomination.

Among the hundreds of nominations confirmed, only one met pronounced opposition. It was that of Dr. Cary T. Grayson, the president's naval aide and physician, to be a rear admiral.

The outstanding achievement of the session was the senate's quick response to President Wilson's plea for a change in rules to limit debate and prevent such filibusters as that which killed the armed neutrality bill.

As the house was not in session, no legislation could be considered.

ADAMSON LAW IS UPHELD

Eight-Hour Day on Railroads Declared Constitutional by Supreme Court.

Washington—The eight-hour standard for railroad wages, provided in the Adamson law, was held constitutional by the supreme court.

The immediate effect of the decision will be to fix a permanent eight-hour basic day in computing wage scales on interstate railroads, for which a nation-wide strike twice has been threatened, and to give, effective from January 1 of this year, increases in wages to trainmen of about 25 per cent, at a cost to the railroads estimated at from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 a year.

The court, through Chief Justice White, declared both carriers and their employees engaged in a business charged with a public interest, subject to the right of congress to arbitrate compulsorily a dispute affecting the operation of that business.

Lovett Urges National Railway Control

Washington—Immediate nationalization of railroad control was urged by Robert E. Lovett, chairman of the board of the Union Pacific, in testimony before the congressional committee investigating all phases of the railway problem. Final disposition of the control question, he declared, would prove a great factor in the grave problem of obtaining new capital with which to continue railroad development.

Tariff Board is Named

Washington—President Wilson has selected the following men as members of the tariff commission: Professor Frank W. Taussig, of Harvard University; ex-Representative David J. Lewis, of Cumberland, Md.; ex-Representative William Kent, of Kentfield, Cal.; Daniel C. Roper, of McCall, S. C.; E. P. Costigan, of Denver; W. S. Culbertson, of Emporia, Kan.

Seattle Employer Held Innocent

Seattle, Wash.—E. P. Erckenbrack, manager of the Border Line Transportation company, was cleared of any complicity in the death of Mabel Howe, a domestic in his home, when a coroner's jury returned a verdict that the girl had come to her death through self-inflicted bullet wound.
