NATION IS CLOSER TO HOSTILITIES

Congress Is Called Into Extra Session to Handle Situation Which Now Looks Nasty.

Washington, March 21.—President Wilson, recognizing that Germany is practically making war on the United States on the seas, today called congress to assemble in extraordinary session on April 2 to deal with the situation.

The purpose of the session, now called two weeks earlier than the date first set, as announced in the president's proclamation, is to receive a communication from the chief executive on "grave questions of national policy."

The president in his address to congress will detail how Germany practically has been making war on the United States by the ruthless destruction of American lives and ships on the high seas in contravention of all the laws of nations and humanity.

Congress is then expected to pass a resolution declaring that a state of war has existed between the United States and Germany for some time.

Such a resolution in itself will not be a declaration of war in a technical sense, although it will amount to practically the same thing.

As a consequence the United States will take further steps to protect its interest on the high seas and elsewhere against the warlike acts of Germany and whether an actual state of war will come to exist in its full sense will depend on the future acts of the imperial German government.

Since last Sunday, when three American ships were sunk off the British Isles in quick succession, with loss of American lives—bringing the total number of American lives lost through German submarine operations to more than 200—the president and all his advisers have recognized that a state of war existed. From all parts of the coun-

try have come calls for the immediate summoning of congress in extra session.

Although the president, by the provisions of the constitution, must leave it to congress to make the practical declaration of war, such advances as have come to the White House from members of congress, governors of states, public officials and many hundreds of citizens have contained statements of support of such a policy in its fullest sense.

The cabinet, which urged the move upon the president at yesterday's session, is described by its members as having been more thoroughly united than it has been on any other question that has come before it.

The nation now actually comes to the point which all the history of centuries indicated must necessarily follow the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany February 3.

U. S. IS FAR FROM PREPARED FOR WAR

Colonel Dentler, of Regular Army, Gives Straight Facts in Talk at the Portland Chamber.

With war impending, America was declared to be pitifully unprepared for it on land and sea by Colonel C. E. Dentler, of the U. S. army, in speaking before the members' council of the Portland chamber of commerce yesterday afternoon at its regular luncheon.

In the light of facts, Colonel Dentler urged that all men who themselves are unable to enlist should do whatever they can to secure men for the army. Lieutenant Colonel Blackburn, who followed, stated that the navy is 16,000 men short, and declared that enlistments must be increased immediately—"because," said he, "we may be at war tomorrow, and the navy is our first line of defense."

Colonel Dentler insisted that employers should encourage their men to enlist in the national guard and similar organizations and assure them of their positions in case they are called upon to give them up for their country's need.

"We may have to call on the people soon," warned Colonel Dentler. "While we are as a nation ready to fight for what is right, we are unprepared in a military way. When the present crisis arose we looked over our military assets and found a regular army of about 80,000 and a large part of it in outside territory from which they could not be withdrawn. We also found our national guard about 120,000 strong, but only partially trained and partially equipped and in poor condition to take the field.

"These men are our present military assets and this at a time when a nation in the Pacific can land 300,000 troops on the Pacific coast within six weeks, and a million armed men can be landed in less than three weeks on the Atlantic coast.

"Recent history proves that wars are sometimes not declared until the armies are afield. Moreover, conditions change relations between governments as they do among individuals. Your best friend today may be tomorrow's worst enemy. We cannot count on the friendship of any nation.

"In a republic, civilians have an equal share in government and are part of the government. Each man owes certain duties to his country, and one of these is the military duty. The national guard needs assistance. Enlistment is slow, and one reason is the attitude taken by business men—the employers. It is the patriotic duty of every employer to get behind the employee that wants to defend his country and to prepare for that great duty.

"But there are employers who do not do so. Such men should awaken and not eat the salaries of men who drill. Moreover, positions vacated by men who answer their country's call shall be held open for that man's return.

"The employee who enlists takes from the employer part of the employer's duty.

"Now are you a citizen—a real one? Are you entitled to the credit of supporting your country?

"You who cannot go to the front can help. You can help by assisting in securing enlistments and by backing the men who do enlist.

"Men of the army do not want war. War means that we must go to the front. We wish for peace—but from study of conditions we know that we must prepare for war. The ocean barrier has been broken down by transportation. We no longer can remain isolated."

WINSOME MAIDS ARE TO ENCOURAGE ENLISTMENTS

Girls Organize to Assist in Getting Men for War Duty.

Salem, Ore., March 19.—Branches of the Girls' Honor Guard have been organized in McMinnville, Dallas, Corvallis and Woodburn, and another is under way for Salem, to assist in getting enlistments for militia companies of the valley and to hearten up the "slackers."

Lieutenant Dana H. Allen, of Company M, National Guard, of this city, has returned from a visit to valley towns, where militia companies are stationed, with optimistic reports of the campaign being made to recruit these companies to the required strength.

Lieutenant Allen was delegated by Adjutant-General White to have supervisory charge of the work in the valley.

"The sentiment of the citizens in all of these cities is that the guard companies are to be kept at any cost," said Lieutenant Allen today. "The citizens' committees in each of the towns is actively at work toward that end, and we expect to have the heartiest kind of cooperation from the girls."

Instructions have gone out from Miss Lucile Danforth, of Portland, to all of the Honor Guards in the cities where militia companies are situated, to take an active part in getting recruits for the National Guard.
