Ship Whisky in Lard.

Eugene Register: A unique way to get liquor into Oregon under the new "bone dry" law which went into effect a short time ago is explained by a Eugene resident who, however, declines to give the name of the man who shipped the liquor in.

According to this man's story, a man engaged in a certain business a short time ago shipped in a tierce of lard. It was a very innocent appearing shipment and no one would have suspected that it contained contraband whisky. The bottles were in the center of the tierce, with the lard smooth and soft at either end to deceive any suspicious officer.

Dr. Sutcliffe Eulogized.

Idaho Falls Times: Dr. Robert Sutcliffe preached his farewell sermon to the people of Idaho Falls Sunday evening last at the American theater.

Dr. Sutcliffe has been in active charge of the Presbyterian church here for the past two years with the exception of the time he has been absent on the chautauqua circuit. It is not often that a city the size of Idaho Falls gets a preacher too big for the church, but such is the case in this instance. Dr. Sutcliffe had been here but a short time when it was found that the church was too small for his congregations. Accordingly what was called the "People's Popular Service" was inaugurated every Sunday evening which held forth at the American theater where nearly a thousand people could congregate.

And from the time of its inception, this innovation, for it was an innovation to Idaho Falls, the American theater has been packed every time Dr. Sutcliffe held services and many listened to his words of inspiration who seldom entered a church. Dr. Sutcliffe has been engaged in the chautauqua work for a number of years and it was through this work that Idaho Falls first knew him.

A little more than two years ago during the chautauqua week a vote was taken by the congregation each day as to the favorite of the many eminent lecturers present during the week and at the end of the session when the votes were canvassed Dr. Sutcliffe was found to be the winner by a large majority.

It was at that time that the Presbyterian church prevailed upon him to take charge of the work here.

Dr. Sutcliffe is a big, broadminded man, with eloquence to spare, who has been called upon many times to address audiences upon public occasions here, and who has always cheerfully responded. Idaho Falls is glad to have had him but is sorry to see him go. He leaves Thursday for southern California where he enters upon a five weeks' lyceum tour and later he will take up a twenty weeks' chautauqua circuit, beginning at New Orleans and extending northward through thirteen states and into two provinces of Canada.

Corvallis, Ore., April 2.—Potato eelworms, the worst potato seed pest known, have appeared in Oregon, and unless checked by careful attention to selecting uninfested seed and planting in uninfested soil, are likely to be distributed widely over the state. They are a serious menace to the potato industry and when once established can hardly be eradicated.

The eelworm is invisible to the naked eye, but its effects can be seen. Infested potatoes are likely to have wrinkled skins with irregular, sunken, grayish areas here and there. Others can be examined only by breaking (not cutting) the potato into bits and searching for small brown spots with pearly centers just under the skin. The spots are not larger than half the size of a pin head, but may run into the potato for a quarter of an inch or more.

"Not one Oregon grower should plant his potato crop without making a careful examination of the seed for signs of the eelworm," says A. L. Lovett, whose O. A. C. extension bulletin, "The Potato Eelworm," is ready for distribution. Every grower should have a copy of this bulletin to aid him in keeping crop and soil free of infestation. It is folly to plant potatoes in infested soil.

Seed should not be obtained from regions of infestation, which will be pointed out in the bulletin. A list of crops attacked by the eelworm, and a list not attacked, are also given.

Births, 11; Deaths, 6.

The report of Health Officer Oglesby for March shows that there were 11 births and 6 deaths. Of the births 9 were males and 2 females. Of the deaths 5 were males and 1 female. Three cases of tuberculosis of the lungs were reported and 7 cases of measles.
