How to Fly the American Flag.

"Display your flag!" is the impulse of the day. "Display your flag properly!" ought to be the injunction, for it detracts greatly from the display to have Old Glory flung improperly to the breeze.

The flag should not be hoisted before sunrise nor be allowed up after sunset and should never be allowed to touch the ground and should never be raised or lowered by any mechanical appliance. When the flag is used as a banner, that is, suspended on a rope across a street, the union, or field, should fly to the north in streets running east and west and to the east in streets running north and south.
