GERMAN CITIZENS HERE MUST GIVE UP FIREARMS

Citizens of Germany are required to give up any firearms of whatsoever nature they may possess to the sheriff or the chief of police, and they will be kept until the war is over. Any alien enemy who fails to surrender such article will be subject to summary arrest if such articles shall be found in his possession; and the articles will be seized and forfeited to the use of the United States.

O. & C. LAND TAX BILL OF NEW IMPORTANCE

Author of Bill Says That Decision of Supreme Court Was Expected.

The action of the United States supreme court upholding the Chamberlain-Ferris law of 1916 and divesting the Southern Pacific company of title to the Oregon and California grant lands increases the importance of the bill which will be voted on in June and has as its object the placing of this land upon the assessment rolls, in the various counties of the state, according to Attorney L. E. Bean, representative from Lane county, who introduced the taxation bill in the legislature.

"I have anticipated that the supreme court would sustain the Chamberlain-Ferris act, but only as an administrative measure, for the reason that the railroad company had persistently violated the settlement-clause of the act, which was held by the court, in the former decision, to be an enforceable covenant," Mr. Bean stated. "The railroad, having

failed to comply with it in the past, could not be expected to comply with it in the future, and, in order that the grant might be administered as originally contemplated and in the light of changed conditions by reason of lapse of time, the Chamberlain-Ferris act has evidently been held to be constitutional as an administrative measure. In other words, the government steps into the shoes of the railroad company to administer the grant, but the lands are not restored to the public domain. The title is invested in the government only for disposition and administrative purposes, which in no way affects the sovereign right of this state to tax the lands.

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
