The Lane county rural schools will get along with only one supervisor this year, according to a recent decision of the county educational board.

Floyd L. Senter was the choice of the board for the one office to be filled.

Mr. Senter has been employed in that capacity for the past two or three months, filling the unexpired term of Miss Jennie Bossen, who resigned to wed.

Mr. Senter's salary will remain as it is at present and he will be paid for 11 months' work in the year.

The members of the board, previous to the meeting, had sounded the sentiment of the people in their respective sections of the county and found the opinion prevailing that the county could get along with one supervisor, and in the interest of economy made such a decision.

Several Similar Accidents at London.

London, Ore., April 30.—(Special to The Sentinel.)—Edward Brasher was severely injured Saturday. He rode a log down the chute to the pond. Before the log reached the pond and while it was traveling at a high rate of speed he jumped to the ground.
