REGISTRATION FOR DRAFT IS OUTLINED

Work Will Be Under Direction of Civil Authorities of the States.

Washington.—An official outline of the method by which military registration is to be carried out under the selective conscription bill was made public with an appeal from the war department for the voluntary services of state election and other officials, in order that there may be no delay in enrolling and classifying millions of men for army duty.

Careful preparation has been made to place the whole task in the hands of civilian officials of the states and to remove every suggestion of military force in putting the measure into effect. The only function of the federal government will be supervision through the office of the provost marshal-general. The department said in part:

"There was a time in the country's history when military enumerators, backed by bayonets, went out among the people to take a compulsory service census. Today, under the principle of universal liability to service, the execution of the law is put into the hands of the people.

"The approval of the new national army bill and the president's proclamation thereunder will be coincidental. All persons within the age limits prescribed will be required to present themselves for registration at the customary voting place in the voting precincts in which they have their permanent homes on a day which the president will announce.

"The governor of each state will be the chief of registration therein. The machinery of registration in each county is to be in charge of the sheriff, the county clerk and the county physician, acting ex-officio, unless a different board shall be announced by the governor. In cities containing populations of more than 30,000 the registration will be under the control of the mayor and selected boards of registration.

"Persons absent from their home counties may be registered by mail. If so absent, a man should go to the clerk of the county where he may be staying on the sixth day after the date of the president's proclamation.

"Persons too sick to present themselves for registration must send a competent person to the county or city clerk on the sixth day after the issuing of the proclamation. The clerk will give instructions for registration."

U. S. PLANS FOR FIRST BIG ARMY

Washington.—The full strength of the first war army organized under the selective draft bill will be 18,538 officers and 528,659 enlisted men,

making up 18 war strength divisions complete in every arm and supplemented by 16 regiments of heavy field artillery, equipped with large caliber howitzers.

In preparation for the enormous task of training this great army, the existing regular establishment and the national guard are being brought to full war strength, giving a total regular and national guard force to be whipped into shape before the new army is called of 21,080 officers and 622,954 men.

From this force will be formed 18 divisions corresponding to the organization of the first new army. From it also, early in September, will be drawn some 200,000 officers and non-commissioned officers who will constitute the framework on which the new army will be shaped.

GOVERNMENT TO BE AGENT

Washington Replaces Wall Street, as Financial Capital of World.

New York.—Washington has replaced Wall street as the world's financial center. Federal reserve banks have taken charge of floating the \$2,000,000,000 "liberty loan" in New York. J. P. Morgan will no longer act as British government financial representative in America. The United States government succeeds him, both as purchasing agent in this country and as controller of allied loans on this side of the Atlantic.

Thus, for the first time in history, Washington becomes the money hub of the earth, as well as the world war capital.

Control of Price of Wheat Planned.

Ottawa, Ont.—Announcement was made in parliament by Sir Thomas White, the minister of finance, that plans are under way for joint action by Canada and the United States to reduce the price of wheat.

Manila Shows Loyalty

Manila.—A great parade of the Filipinos of Manila was held here Saturday as a demonstration and pledge of their allegiance to the United States.

Gompers Appeals to Russian Masses.

Washington.—A plea against a premature peace for Russia and renewed assurances that American wage-earners and the American people are in hearty sympathy with the Russian democratic movement are included in a long cablegram sent by President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, to the executive committee of the council of workmen's and soldiers' delegates at Petrograd.

Great American Merchant Fleet Plan.

Washington.—Congress will be asked to appropriate \$1,000,000,000 for the building of the great American merchant fleet which is to overcome the submarine menace.

Estimates of the shipping board are that between five and six million tons of steel and wooden vessels will be constructed by the government during the next two years.

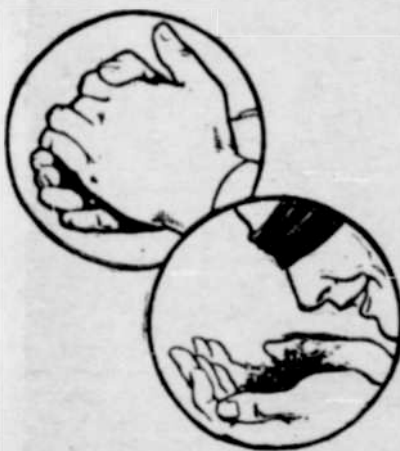
