"Life's Dream Is O'er," and which was highly appreciated.

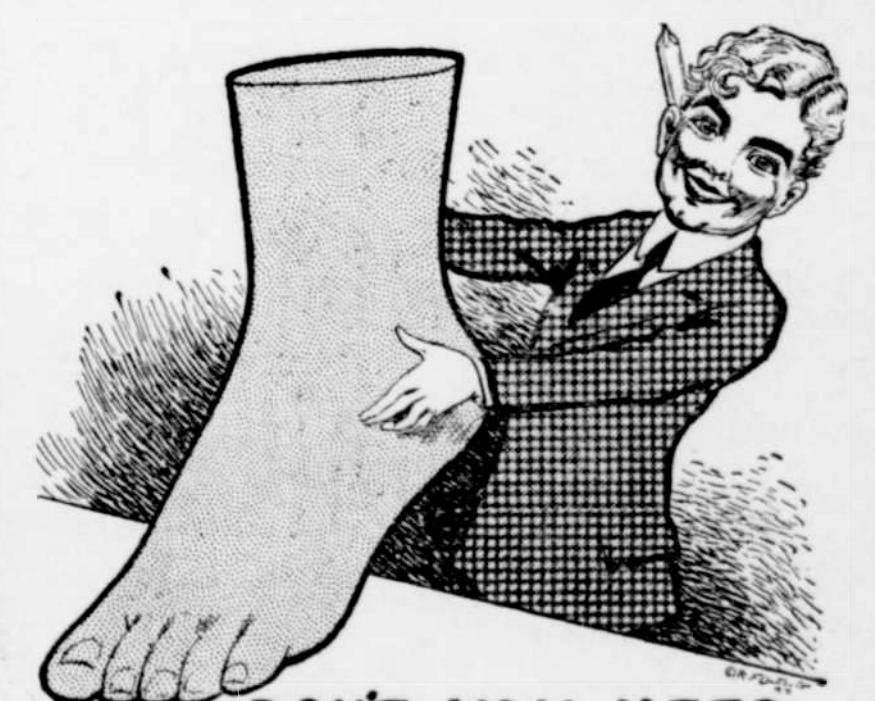
