Executors Say Charges Are Without Any Grounds Whatever.

deceased, has been made for a number of years and that certain deeds were obtained from Spare while he was alive, through fraudulent means, a number of heirs have filed a petition in probate court for the removal of Ben Lurch and Walter Huff as executors of the estate.

Spare died in Cottage Grove January 11, 1915, leaving an estate valued at several thousand dollars. Now come Jessie I. Hagins, Kate Walton, Carl Taylor, Kate Sparks, B. T. Gray, Mary Ellen Austin and Alice Taylor, heirs-at-law of the estate, and ask that the executors appear and show cause why they should not be removed.

The petitioners state that the executors have not made a report since the semi-annual report October 11, 1915. They claim this report shows that large sums were paid for the expenses of the estate without showing as to the justice or correctness of the claims. It is further alleged that the executors allowed a claim of \$1500 in favor of Mrs. L. A. Huff, who is the wife of one of the executors, and that the claim was false, fictitious and fraudulent. It is alleged that Lurch and Huff before the death of Spare took advantage of weakened physical and mental condition and through undue influence over him obtained deeds to certain property owned by him.

Mr. Lurch and Mr. Huff, both of this city, are not worrying much about the outcome of the case. They cared for Mr. Spare and looked after his business affairs for many years before his death, when relatives failed to do so. They say there are no grounds whatever for charges of fraud.

### SPRING FLOWERS

Thalictum is a delicate looking plant with leaves resembling the fronds of the English Maidenhair fern. It is easily transplanted and thrives under cultivation. The flowers are imperfect, the stamens and pistils growing on separate plants. Neither has petals, but the panicles of staminate flowers although inconspicuous are quite pretty, resembling brown fringe.

Thalictum is said to be derived from a Greek word meaning to be green. There are three species growing in our woods, the most common being occidentale and polycarpum (the very tall variety with many carpels or seeds). Sparsiflorum has perfect flowers,

which slightly resemble white Dodecatheon although they are much smaller and the flowers are in panicles.

### O. & C. TAX BILL NOT TO BE ON THE BALLOT

The supreme court of the state of Oregon has ruled that the measure that would put the Oregon & California land grant lands back on the tax rolls shall not appear on the ballot at the special June election. In Lane county the ballots have already been printed and instructions will be sent to election clerks to cancel this measure on the ballots as they are passed out to the voters.

### Method of School Levy Changed.

The last Oregon legislature made a radical change in the manner in which school districts will levy the local school tax at the annual meeting. Heretofore the board has estimated the amount of money necessary and then figured out the rate of taxation to be imposed to meet these needs, which rate was voted on by the electors.

Hereafter all school districts will adopt the budget system, and decide on the sum of money to be raised. The matter of setting the number of mills on the dollar of property necessary to raise that amount will be left to the assessor. If the districts have outstanding indebtedness it will be necessary to add that amount to the sum necessary to be raised and certify the total amount to the assessor.
