About eighteen of the young folks of this neighborhood met at the H. H. Kibbey home Sunday evening to entertain Mr. and Mrs. Pekrul.

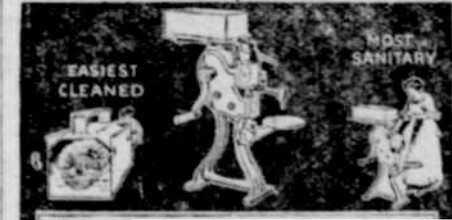
"SLACKERS" WILL BE SOUGHT AND ARRESTED

Officers Are Comparing Election Books and Registration Cards.

As soon as the county clerk and other members of local registration boards complete the task of segregating the names and preparing a report of the war census taken last week, they will begin a search of the registration books used in the last election for the purpose of ascertaining whether or not there are any persons in Lane county of con-

scriptionable age who failed to register. In the event that there are any "slackers" in Lane county they will be promptly arrested and their names will be sent to United States District Attorney Clarence L. Reames, of Portland. The United States district attorney will in turn present the names of the "slackers" to the federal grand jury and indictments will probably follow. Sheriff Parker says all peace officers in Lane county have been instructed to question young men whom they may suspect of being "slackers," in accordance with instructions received from the military officials at Portland. If they are of conscriptionable age, they cannot show a little green card, they will be arrested and prosecuted. No excuses will be accepted by Sheriff Parker or his deputies.

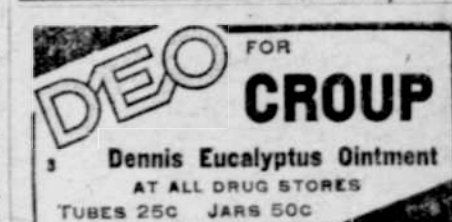
