Another Pioneer of the Early Fifties  
Passes Away.

Mrs. Rachel E. Taylor, one of the best known of the pioneers of the early fifties, died Monday morning at ten o'clock at the old family homestead 7 miles south of this city, where she had resided since her marriage over half a century ago.

Mrs. Taylor was born in Missouri October 31, 1842. Her husband, "Uncle Jerry" Taylor, preceded her to the better land something over a year ago.

She is survived by five children: George, who lived with her on the old place; John, Mrs. A. S. Powell and Mrs. E. A. Leslie, of this city, and Henry, who lives in Washington.

The funeral will be conducted from the home at two o'clock this afternoon by Rev. Callison, of the Christian church, and the remains will be laid to rest in the Taylor Lane cemetery.
