FIRM INVESTS IN \$5000 WORTH OF LIBERTY BONDS

McMorran & Washburne, of Eugene, Show Their Patriotism.

The firm of McMorran & Washburne, of Eugene, purchased \$5000 worth of Liberty bonds through the United States National bank Thursday morning.

Another purchase is expected to be made in July and another in August.

"It is the solemn and patriotic duty of every firm and individual in the United States to immediately subscribe for Liberty bonds," said George H. McMorran, senior member of the firm. "It matters not whether it be \$50 or \$50,000, but one should subscribe for as much as he can afford."

Money is just as important as shot and shell in this war and we must by popular subscription show the world that every American is back of his government, not only in spirit, but in heart and soul.

"Our firm expects to make two more purchases, one in July and another in August."

This is the largest subscription yet given by a firm in Eugene to the Liberty Loan Bond issue outside of the banks and it is predicted that it will be the example for many other subscriptions to this most important cause.
