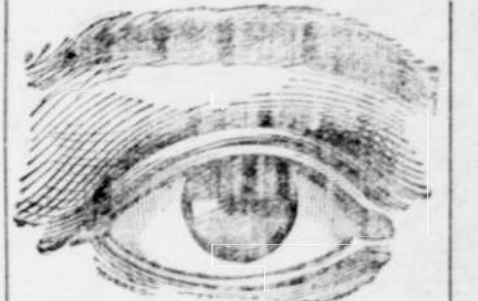
A chimney fire in the Ridings home on Knox hill called out the fire department Sunday evening. The fire was put out before the department could reach the scene.
