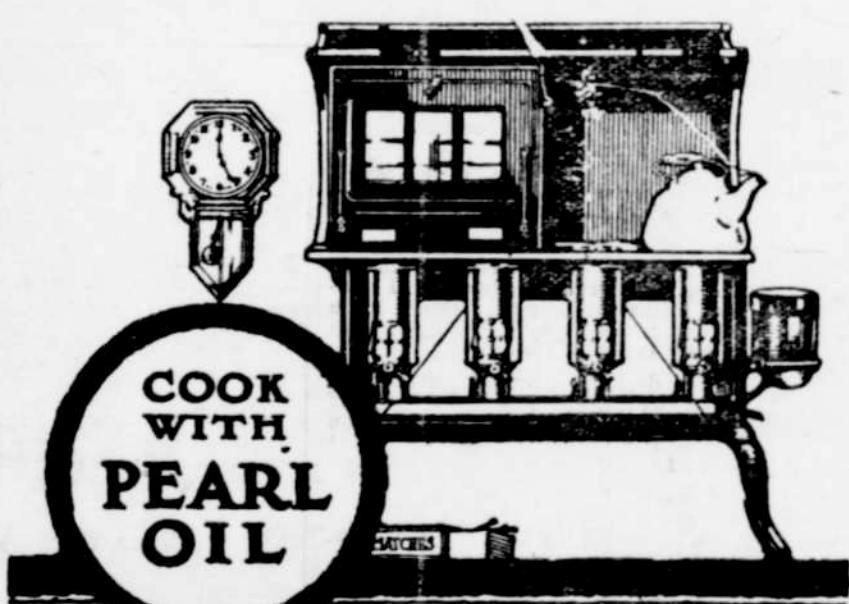

ACTION OF COUNTY COURT LITTLE SHORT OF CRIMINAL

That little stretch of the Pacific highway between Cottage Grove and the Douglas county line is getting more and more considerable unfavorable comment over the state. Every tourist who makes the trip over this road expresses his opinion in no uncertain terms. Dozens of visitors from other states have come to The Guard office to file their complaints, and judging from the number of interviews that appear in the Portland tourists seek these papers to air their grievances about this little stretch of highway.

J. W. Working, who returned yesterday from a trip to Los Angeles, told a reporter that the worst piece of road between Eugene and Los Angeles was found in the southern end of Lane county, "a disgrace to any civilized community."

W. H. Cowles, proprietor of the Spokesman Review at Spokane, and northwest director for the Associated Press, was delighted with Oregon's scenery, "if only that little piece of road near Cottage Grove was put in shape to travel."
Of course no one expects the county commissioners to get a pick and shovel and hike up there and fix that road, but when the state highway commission offered to spend \$75,000 in putting in seven miles of hard surface, to reject the proposition and in lieu thereof accept \$5000 to put on a few yards of gravel and do a bit of scraping, it was little short of criminal—Eugene Guard.
