

MOBILIZATION OF BOYS BRINGS WAR HOME

Flower of County's Manhood Is Ready to Make Any Sacrifices Demanded

Khaki-clad Soldiers Drilling in Preparation for Going to Foreign Shore to Defeat Barbarism and Restore Peace to Earth.

With 90 or more of the boys and men of Cottage Grove, Oregon, and the Cottage Grove country mobilized here in Sixth company and drilling in preparation for transportation to the far thing battle front in France or Russia, citizens are made to realize that we really are at war and that some from among these robust men and boys picked from the very flower of our citizenry may find a soldier's grave on foreign shores and return no more to fill the void their departure will make in the life of some family in the community. Khaki-clad and apparently happy in the opportunity offered them to make any necessary sacrifice for the sake of the country that has given them so much, they are going through their daily routine of drilling. Little of form, springy of step, physically perfect, full of the bloom of healthy manhood, when lined up for reveille or marching up and down the streets, a sight of them thrills the heart with a patriotic fervor and causes a keen pang in the heart to realize that they will face shot and shell in a war that is not of their making, that is not of our making, and that they must offer themselves a living sacrifice because of the almost unbelievable barbarism of another nation, or because of the unbridled ambitions of a war-drunk Kaiser.

With the exception of 15 Portland men, who will become members of this company, and Andrew J. Brewer, who was on his way here from Wood, Calif., every member of the company was present at reveille Wednesday morning when the Stars and Stripes were hoisted over the armory, admission to which is, for the first time, denied civilians except by permission of the commanding officers. Khaki-clad guards, on duty day and night, see that all regular army regulations in regard to approaching the lines are respected.

SOLDIER BOYS TO BE GUESTS OF CITY FRIDAY

Everyone Invited to Join in Basket Picnic in Honor of the Men About to Leave

Arrangements have been completed for a public function to be given at city park Friday afternoon in honor of the members of Sixth company and any others of other arms of the service who may be in the city at the time. The stores of the city will close at 3:30 and the program will commence at 4 o'clock with music by the band. The principal speaker will be made by Rev. J. Kings, of Lebanon, chaplain of the coast artillery regiment, and formerly of this city.

Following the program a basket picnic will be held, to which all who may desire to attend have been invited. All except members of the militia and other arms of the service, old soldiers and members of the relief corps, will bring their own baskets. The soldier boys, the veterans and their wives, and members of the relief corps will be guests of the city and will be served at tables. After the supper there will be an informal program of short toasts.

FOREST FIRES ARE RAGING IN THE RESERVE

Unusually Dry Condition of the Woods Makes Fighting the Flames Very Difficult

Dangerous forest fires have been burning the past week in the forest reserve east of here. The hardest to fight and the most dangerous is on June mountain, where there is a crew of some 30 fire fighters of the forestry department trained in that work. A crew of 20 was brought out from Roseburg, and went out on a special train. Another crew of 15 men is fighting a fire in the territory in which the U. S. Logging company is operating. This fire started from a donkey engine. The origin of the other fire is not known.

The June mountain fire is made particularly hard to fight because of the fact that burning timbers slide down the mountain and start new fires out of the forest. The wind has not been favorable for back firing, adding further difficulties. A heavy rain is needed to quench the flames which are hard to handle on account of the extremely dry condition of the woods.

Invents "Chemical Hell"

Sergeant McCaleb Will Offer Government Preparation Which May Prove of Value in Prosecuting War

Sergeant W. S. McCaleb, of Sixth company, has invented a liquid which he believes may prove of great benefit to the United States in prosecuting the war and which he will offer to the government. He calls the liquid "chemical hell." There are two chemicals which, when brought together, ignite and pouring upon the floor serves to start a fire. The fire cannot be extinguished and when once ignited the chemicals must be consumed. A large bottle is used to contain one of the chemicals. The other is placed in a small bottle and this is placed inside the larger bottle. If the two bottles are dropped any distance they will break and the chemicals unite and ignite.

Sergeant McCaleb thinks his invention could be used to great advantage by aeroplanes and that whole cities could be set afire in a few minutes. But a small amount is necessary to start a flame and the cost is less than 12 cents a gallon.

STORES WILL CLOSE AT 3:30 FRIDAY AFTERNOON IN HONOR OF SOLDIER BOYS

MESS FUND IS SHORT OF THE DESIRED AMOUNT

The drive conducted by the women of the city to complete the mess fund, to secure funds to pay the expenses of a farewell function for the soldier boys, and for material for comfort kits, resulted in adding but \$183.05 to the treasury. At least \$400 was wanted. There are a number of pledges to the fund that have not yet been paid. With these the money secured from the dance Saturday night, and to be made at the farewell dance next Saturday night, the contribution by Emphrey & Macklin, the \$20 contribution from Dorena, and the amount collected by the boys themselves in their round of the business houses the day before mobilization, the fund will be close to \$400. In order that the boys here may go away as well looked after as the boys of other cities, it should be raised to \$500 or \$600.

WASTE NOT, WANT NOT IS GOVERNMENT ADVICE

Department of Agriculture Issues Bulletins Giving Methods.

Washington, D. C., July 25.—Those who heed the advice of the United States department of agriculture to plant gardens this year are now wondering how best to preserve their surplus fruits and vegetables. The specialists of the department who have tried out various methods for canning, preserving, drying, pickling and making jam, have recently issued bulletins showing how this work may be done successfully. Anyone can have these publications for the asking, so ignorance of the proper procedure will not serve as a legitimate excuse for allowing any garden produce to spoil this year.

Farmers' bulletin 839 contains directions for canning by the one-period cold pack method all kinds of fruits and vegetables as well as fruit juices, soups, meats, camp rations and mushrooms.

When canning is not feasible or cans and jars are too expensive, drying of surplus products which go to waste each year. Drying also affords a way of conserving portions of food too small for canning. Drying may be done in the kitchen stove, or before an electric fan. Farmers' bulletin 841 tells just how to do this, using one of the driers now on the market or an homemade apparatus.

These bulletins are sent upon request to the Division of Publications, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

AUGUST 22 IS DATE SET FOR BIG JOINT PICNIC

Wednesday, August 22, is the date and Riverview park, between the butte and the river, is the place of the big picnic to be held jointly by the chamber of commerce of Eugene and the Pomona grange of Lane county. A beef barbecue will be one of the leading features.

CANNERY IS OPERATING THREE DAYS A WEEK

The cannery is operating every other day taking care of the loganberry crop and the first of the bean crop. The cherry pack has been completed. President Knowles estimates that the season's pack will reach \$8000 and may reach \$10,000. It would have been larger had it not been for the long spell of hot, dry weather which cut down the amount of berries and beans.

FRENCH BOOKS ARE ISSUED TO SOLDIERS

The headquarters of the coast artillery has received a number of copies of English and French conversation books. In these books are given the English word or phrase, the French word or phrase, followed by its pronunciation. The contents include phrases for landing, marching, training, camping, transport, convey, aviation, action, purchasing, wounded, conversations, money, weights, etc., also a vocabulary of common words. English books have been received to permit issuing two to each company.

GROVE MEN AMONG REGIMENTAL OFFICERS

Cottage Grove is well represented in the staff and field officers of the coast artillery regiment. Lieutenant-colonel Berton K. Lawson and Major Harry K. Metcalf are of this city. Captain Wilard A. Elkins, regimental chaplain, is formerly of this city, and Lewis C. Beebe, first on the list of second lieutenants, is here to attend the university at Eugene.

TROOPS WILL BE HELD IN CAMPS UNTIL 1918

The coast artillerymen of Oregon, other national guard units and the troops of the 687,000 drafted army are to be held in reserve in American training camps until after the first of the year, according to announcement of the war department. None of these troops will see fighting in France until the spring drive of the allied forces begins.

ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF BEING A SLACKER

The first arrest here on the charge of being a slacker took place Saturday, Kenneth Seymour French being the man accused. French claims to be but 20 years of age and could easily pass for that age, but he is said to have recently given his age to a prospective employer at Portland as 23. He was taken before United States Commissioner Dillard at Eugene and placed under bonds of \$1000.

EUGENE GETS FIRST MONEY FOR HARD SURFACING

County Court Suddenly Relieved of Difficulty in Finding the Necessary Money

Cottage Grove will not get the first hard surface in Lane county, despite the fact that it is the first to keep his word to that effect. The county court could not find the money to prepare the grade and, besides, residents in the district where the first road was to have been laid, said they preferred macadam.

But, although the court could not find the money to lay hard surface for Cottage Grove, it seems to have met with no such difficulty when a Eugene road was concerned. In fact a Eugene of paper says: "Inasmuch as there are funds lying idle in the treasury, there is no reason why the work should not be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible." The road which will be prepared for hard surface at the present time is the Junction City-Monroe road, in the preparing of which the Lane county court will cooperate with the Benton county court.

With the improvement of this stretch of road, the road in the county ready for hard surface will extend to within three miles of Eugene and the hard surface will, undoubtedly, be laid the entire distance and the Eugene people will make an effort to extend the hard surface to the city limits.

As long as Cottage Grove can't get the hard surface, it is glad to see some other part of the county get it, but Cottage Grove people feel that the county court had done a whole lot of chuckling over the way it was made so easy for them to take the money away from here and spend it at the county seat. Such action always results in fanning the members of county division, which never completely die out.

Club Takes Up Roads Question.

Very much dissatisfied with the manner in which the county court is handling the road problem, the commercial club at its meeting Monday night appointed a committee to visit the county court and learn if there isn't some way to get a square deal for this end of the county.

Soldiers Get Song Hit.

Cal. A. Barnett, of Eugene, has dedicated one of his latest song hits, "The Dear Old Stars and Stripes," which was first sung in public by Miss Bess Henderson at the traveling men's picnic at Cottage Grove a number of weeks ago, to the Oregon national guard for the benefit of the soldiers of the state. The song was so well taken by the traveling men that they have agreed to pay the expense of a publication of 5000 copies, also the expense of copyrighting the song, and will turn sale receipts over to the soldiers.

FORTY GROVE MEN ARE DRAWN IN NEW ARMY

On Account of Number of Volunteers, None Will Be Required to Report Now

Many of Those Selected Are Already in Service, and Many Are Exempt Because of Dependents or Physical Imperfections.

Forty or more young men of Cottage Grove and the Cottage Grove country were drawn in the selective draft last week. Of these possibly half are likely to be found exempt because of having dependents, or being physically incapacitated, or being engaged in production of foodstuffs. Because of the large number of volunteers from Cottage Grove and other parts of Lane county, none of those drawn will be called for the first army. When Lane county men are called, however, they will be taken in the order in which their names were drawn.

The first name drawn for Lane county was that of Leon Arne, a Cottage Grove man who served as a regular in the Spanish-American war, seeing service in the Philippines. He also has some reputation as an expert in the many art of self-defense, having appeared in numerous boxing exhibitions. The Sentinel has been informed by Capt. Woods that Kelly Cooper, Floyd Miles, Earl Groat and Francis C. Medley, all members of Sixth company, were drawn in the selective draft. Their names, however, have not been published.

Robin Powell, a member of Sixth company, was registered in Salt Lake City, and Floyd Hartzell, a member of the same company, was registered in Illinois.

Within a few days official lists of the draft serial numbers, showing the order in which they were drawn in the lottery at Washington, will reach the various county exemption boards. Following receipt of these lists, the boards will notify the men called up on the first draft.

Until then it will not be necessary for those subject to call on the first draft to report. But as soon as they receive notification from physical examination boards, they must report promptly on the day designated.

The first step taken by each board will be to post in a conspicuous place a list containing the names of all the men registered in its county or district, in the exact order in which they will be called on the first and all succeeding drafts. A copy of this list will also be given the press for publication.

Having posted this list and given a copy to the press, the boards will then notify by letter every man called up on the first draft. Each man will be directed to appear before the board for physical examination on a specified date, which will be within seven days of mailing of the notice. In Lane county, however, there will probably be no such notices at present.

Regardless of whether a man intends to apply for exemption or discharge, he must appear for physical examination on the day set. He has seven days from the posting of the list and the mailing of the notice to him by the board in which to file application for exemption, and ten days longer in which to file proof.

No claims for exemption because of employment in necessary industries, including agriculture, can be considered by the county exemption boards. Such a claim must be made on one of the three district appeal boards, at Portland, Eugene, or La Grande, and can only be made after the man has passed his physical examination and certified by the county board as called for military service and not exempt.
