HANG THE TRAITORS.

Of course it is impossible to condone the act of those Butte men who lynched an I. W. W. agitator, but we can, without hesitancy, say that hanging was what he deserved.

Not only did he stir up trouble that would have resulted in the killing of others for whose death his hanging would have but partially recompensed, but in these times of war, he committed an act of treason—and the punishment of treason is death.

Peremptory methods will have to be taken by the government to care for these treasonable trouble-makers. The imposition of a few death sentences would have a salutary effect upon others, as well as upon the person suffering the penalty.

These are not times for cutting up any monkeyshines. There are patriotic citizens sufficient to make it unhealthy for those allies of Germany who would cripple our industries and impede our prosecution of a war against barbarism and frightfulness.

ARE WE A-COMING OR A-GOING?

A few days ago a visitor to our fair city, after visiting the residence district of different sections, remarked that there must be something wrong with Cottage Grove; that it must be on the down grade. He explained that the reason he made this remark was because he found sidewalks going to decay, broken boards in many places and boards everywhere that settled under the foot because nails had become loose through rust and decay of the boards. And the weeds—such slovenliness as this, he said, could not be tolerated in a city with any pretensions whatever.

While not absolutely correct, perhaps, as to the conclusions he drew from the facts stated, yet he told us something that we should take to heart.

Having become accustomed to the loose and broken boards, and the unsightly weeds having become so familiar to us that they no longer shock our esthetic sense, we do not think of the impression they make on visitors.

While it may be the duty of the street commissioner to notify us that our sidewalks must be repaired and that weeds must be cut, yet it should not be necessary for us to be told to do the things which a little pride should impel us to do.

A few nails would make many sidewalks as good as new—and nails cost

but a few pennies. In a city where lumber is so cheap there is hardly any excuse for broken or rotten boards in sidewalks, when a few pennies would replace them.

As for the weeds—to allow them to grow along our sidewalks is a certain sign of lack of energy to take the few moments necessary to remove them.

Pride alone should impel and compel us to do these things without outsiders coming in to taunt us about them.

A city is the counterpart of its citizenry. If citizens are shiftless and slovenly and lack the energy and pride to keep their property from going to decay, the city will reflect that condition of its citizens and fall into decay.

When you see a city with neat streets and well-kept sidewalks, you know that city is up and a-coming, and you know it has live citizens who take an interest in the impression the city makes on visitors.

Are we up and a-coming, or are we down and a-going?

That's up to the citizens to decide.

YOUR DUTY.

The welfare of the nation depends at this time upon the working of its industries to their fullest capacity.

Cottage Grove is the home of industries whose activity and prosperity are vital to the welfare of the nation.

There are those who would cripple these industries; who would harass our country in its time of trial and trouble by crippling industries of every kind.

We think there are no such people in Cottage Grove. The people of Cottage Grove are patriotic citizens and, much as they regret the necessity of war, they are determined to do their part in bringing it to a successful termination.

But it is not alone necessary that they shall be ready to do their part—they must be on the lookout for those who would prevent them from doing their bit.

They must be on the lookout for I. W. W. and other traitors to a land which has given them so much.

Patriotic citizens should immediately report any disloyal, unpatriotic or treasonable talk or action. Any person who expresses himself in any disloyal or suspicious manner, or acts in that manner, should be at once reported to the authorities that he may be properly taken care of and put where he will have no opportunity to carry on his nefarious work.

A person who fails to report traitorous talk or action in a sense becomes an accomplice to the crime.

Let every man do his duty in this respect. His country's welfare is at stake.

Spray for Codling Moth.

The first adult moth of the second brood of codling moth appeared on the night of August 6.

Spraying for this brood of the moth should be done within a week from this time.

Use only arsenate of lead at the rate of one pound of the dry arsenate or two pounds of the paste to each 50 gallons of water. The danger of infestation from this brood of moth will extend over a period of at least four weeks.
