**CONGRESS EXPECTS TO QUIT IN SEPTEMBER**

**Much Legislation Will Have to Be Disposed of Before Adjournment.**

Washington.—The legislative programme remaining for the extra session of congress has assumed such definite form that leaders expressed hope for a vacation about September 15, or not later than October 1.

Included in the programme for disposal within the next three or four weeks are:

The \$2,000,000,000 war tax bill.

A new war budget authorizing about \$7,500,000,000 in bonds, probably at 4 per cent, for further loans to the allies and to retire the \$2,000,000,000 of 3 1/2 per cent bonds already authorized and providing for \$2,000,000,000 of certificates of indebtedness and a like amount of small denomination war savings certificates.

A deficiency appropriation measure aggregating between \$5,000,000,000 and \$7,000,000,000, now being prepared by the house appropriations committee.

The administration trading-with-the-enemy bill, which passed the house July 11.

The administration measure for insurance of soldiers and sailors.

The Webb export trade bill, peace resolutions, in the senate, extension of the espionage act and several minor measures.

**100,000 TROOPS IN FRANCE BY FALL**

Washington.—There will be more than 100,000 U. S. troops in France before snow flies. It is said that ample shipping facilities are already available for the transport of troops as soon as they are ready.

The order of their going has been tentatively mapped out, with the "rain-bow," New England, New York, Pennsylvania and Illinois divisions favored for the first chance because they have been organized as divisional units for some years.

The news of the sufficiency of the shipping at hand for transport service came from the shipping board, confirming the prediction made by Secretary Daniels three weeks ago to the effect that when the time came the ships would be at hand. It is known here that many more than the original Pershing expedition are already in France.

**EUROPEAN WAR NEWS**

A total of 114 German airplanes have been brought down during the past week in fierce sky fighting that has been in progress in connection with the allied offensive.

The French and Italians have started monster offensives—the French against the Germans near Verdun and the Italians against the Austrians from the region of Piava to near the headwaters of the Adriatic sea.

There has been a considerable stiffening in the front in Roumania and also in Russia in the region of Vilna. South of Grozecht, southern Moldavia, the Russians have made a stand against attacks of the teutonic allies and repulsed them.

Both the British and French continue to make sallies at various points and to strengthen the positions won in the recent fighting in Flanders. The Canadians around Lens daily are biting further into the German line and now have the coal center virtually surrounded.

The airmen of the allies are working havoc with the German flyers and on German works far behind the lines. In aerial raids the allied machines have bombarded numerous towns, railway stations and cantonments, the raids extending as far as Selzete, near the Dutch border, 18 miles from Ghent, which also received a visitation.

In Roumania the Austro-Germans have forced back the Roumanians on both sides of the Oltuz and Trotus valleys, according to the Berlin official communication. In the former sector more than 1500 Roumanians and 30 machine guns fell into the hands of the invaders, while in fighting on the Sereth river 2000 additional prisoners were taken.

**Lovett in Control of Transportation.**

Washington.—Government control of the coal industry moved a step nearer when President Wilson formally named Robert S. Lovett, of the war industries board, director of priority of transportation and approved an order issued by Judge Lovett directing that rail and steamship lines give bituminous coal shipments to the northwest preference over all other freight movements.

**Bernstorff Sent to Turkey.**

Amsterdam.—Count von Bernstorff, the former German ambassador to the United States, has been appointed, according to the Berlin Vossische Zeitung, to represent Germany at Constantinople.

**Hogs Are \$23 in Chicago.**

Chicago.—Hogs sold for \$20 a hundred pounds here Tuesday.

**HOOVER REQUESTS MORE ECONOMIES**

Washington, D. C.—The United States and its allies face a wheat deficit of 400,000,000 bushels unless new economies are introduced, declared Herbert Hoover in appealing again to the American people to eliminate waste and to conserve wheat by substituting other cereals.

"The allies," said Mr. Hoover in a formal statement, "are isolated from those markets, other than Canada and the United States, on which they were accustomed to rely before the war."

"The deficit of 400,000,000 bushels can be at least partially overcome if we can increase exports from \$8,000,000 to 220,000,000 bushels. This can be accomplished if we will substitute one pound of other cereals for one pound of wheat flour weekly per person; that is, if we reduce our consumption of wheat flour from five pounds per week to four pounds per week per person."

"It will be no privation to us and will reduce the privations of our allies."

**INSTALL DRYER AT PRISON**

**Walla Walla Valley Growers Finance Scheme of Saving Waste Fruit.**

Walla Walla, Wash.—A fruit-drying plant with a capacity of 20 tons a day is to be in operation at the state prison within 30 days, work of excavating for the kilns having been started. Culls and the ordinary waste fruit of the valley will be handled.

The plant will be ready for the apple crop this fall and when that is handled, if potatoes are cheap, they will be dried. Other vegetables will likely be put through the drying process.

Walla Walla valley growers have financed the scheme to the extent of buying the machinery and equipment, which is to be installed in the old jute mill warehouse. Here the fruit which ordinarily would go to waste is to be dried by convict labor. The state will charge tolls for doing the work. After deducting the share of fruit for doing the drying the remainder will be returned to the owner to be disposed of.

**Italians Take 10,000 Prisoners.**

Rome.—The Italians in their offensive on the Isonzo river and already have taken 10,000 prisoners. It was officially announced by the war department. Guns and many machine guns have been captured by the Italians, and the Austrians have suffered serious loss.

**Troops Wreck I. W. W. Hall.**

Port Angeles, Wash.—A number of guardsmen, including guardsmen from the cutter Snohomish, wrecked the Industrial Workers of the World headquarters here, throwing the furniture and heaps of literature into the bay.

**American Soldiers Will Train in Cuba.**

Washington.—Cuba's offer to provide a mobilization and training ground for some American forces has been accepted. The number or description of the forces to be sent cannot be disclosed for military reasons.

**British Columbia to Be Dry in October.**

Victoria, B. C.—The province of British Columbia will become prohibition territory on October 1, under a law passed by the provincial legislature and signed by the lieutenant governor.

- 1st. To meet the running expenses of the school and to pay outstanding warrants consisting of about \$4,000.00.
- 2nd. To pay \$1,000.00 of the bonded indebtedness of the school district.
- 3rd. To meet increased expenses of the school district, such as the salary of an additional high school teacher, made necessary by increased attendance.
- 4th. A twenty per cent reduction of the value of the real estate of the school district was made after the levy last year, causing a deficit.
