**MRS. ALICE S. FASKET
SUED FOR ACCOUNTING**

Daughter is Plaintiff, Mother Defendant, in Suit Over Property.

Minnie S. Howard and Charles J. Howard vs. Alice S. Fasket, Charles M. Fasket, Thomas C. Abrams, Ivy Abrams, Grace McClelland and Oscar O. McClelland, defendants, is the title of a complaint filed in the circuit court yesterday.

The complaint of plaintiff recites that W. H. Abrams, deceased, was the owner of certain property in Cottage Grove, Eugene and other places; that the former wife of the deceased, now Alice S. Fasket, verbally promised her former husband, W. H. Abrams, deceased, that in case said W. H. Abrams died first, that she would convey to said children of deceased certain described property owned by said W. H. Abrams; that the children of deceased are Minnie S. Howard, Grace McClelland and Thomas C. Abrams, all by a former wife.

The plaintiffs further complain that the said Alice S. Fasket has refused to keep said agreement to turn over said property involved in the suit; that the said property wrongfully held by said Alice S. Fasket is worth \$22,500 in the open market; further, that the said Alice Fasket, as trustee to the said property, refuses to carry the trust imposed upon her into execution.

Wherefore, plaintiffs, Minnie S. Howard and Charles J. Howard, pray that said Alice S. Fasket be decreed to be a trustee to carry into execution the verbal promise made to said W. H. Abrams, deceased, and to convey to said children of deceased all right and title to the property involved in said suit.
