PACIFISTS' MEETING IS HELD IN CHICAGO

Chicago.—After being driven from three states, the People's Council of America for Democracy and the Terms of Peace perfected a formal organization at a public meeting in Chicago Sunday.

The session was held under protection of the police, acting on orders from Mayor William Hale Thompson, which were in defiance of Governor Frank O. Lowden. Four companies of national guardsmen, rushed from the state capital on a special train to prevent the meeting, arrived after it had adjourned, its purpose accomplished.

The clash in authority between Mayor Thompson and Governor Lowden came as the result of the action of police in breaking up the pacifist meeting Saturday on orders from the governor.

"So far as I am concerned, I purpose to put it to the test, that those who are not for the government are against it," said Governor Frank O. Lowden in a statement in regard to the meeting of the Council for Democracy and Terms of Peace, held under orders from Mayor Thompson before the governor could get troops to Chicago to prevent the meeting.

EUROPEAN WAR NEWS

The American aviation service has opened its headquarters near the front.

The Italians have taken more than 27,000 prisoners since the beginning of their big offensive along the entire Austrian front.

The British forces in Palestine attacked southwest of Gaza on a front of 300 yards. It was announced officially. The line was advanced 200 yards.

The headquarters of Major-General Pershing, the American commander, have been moved from Paris to a point near the training camps.

The latest communications from the Roumanian battle front report fierce resistance, often favorable for Russo-Roumanian forces, against violent enemy attacks from the region of Oltuz, Ocna and the valleys of the Sereth and the Putna. The losses have been heavy on both sides.

In Flanders the British guns are again thundering the threat of renewed infantry thrusts against the German lines. The French, while comparatively quiescent in the Verdun region, are giving another display of their successful dashing tactics in the Aisne region.

SHORT NEWS NUGGETS

Meat prices must have a drop, was the ultimatum said to have been delivered to the packers by Herbert Hoover.

A federal district judge at Greensboro, North Carolina, has held that the child labor law passed by congress on the urgent appeal of President Wilson is unconstitutional.

The "People's Council" has been denied the right to hold its peace convention in Minnesota and at Fargo, North Dakota, and was driven out of Hudson, Wisconsin, by indignant citizens.

Conscientious objectors accepted for military service were advised by Secretary Baker to make no protest until assigned in training camp to some task particularly violating their scruples.

Wednesday 34,350 young men, the first 5 per cent of the national army that will be America's reply to Prussianism's challenge, went into camp.

The second group will be made up of 40 per cent of each board's quota and will be mobilized September 19 and the four days following. Another 40 per cent will be mobilized October 3 and the rest as soon after that date as possible.

COMMANDER ORDERS EVACUATION OF RIGA

Believed Germany Will Make
a Quick, Hard Drive on
Petrograd.

London.—A quick, hard drive from Riga to Petrograd is London's forecast of Germany's Russian campaign. Military experts believe Germany will do her utmost in speed. The Germans must go far in the 320-mile journey toward the Russian capital before freezing weather sets in.

Following up rapidly the advantage they gained in driving the Russians across the Dvina river on both sides of Uxkrull, the Germans threw bridges across this stream and soon were on the heels of the former defenders, some of whom offered resistance, but others of whom showed the white feather, giving the invaders no trouble in marching up the eastern bank of the Dvina toward Riga, 15 miles distant.

Seeing the disaffection and the inability to stem the tide of the advance, the Russian commander ordered an evacuation of Riga and its garrison and the civilian population are in retreat eastward.

Behind them the Russians, in their retreat from Riga, are laying the country in waste, burning villages and farms. Whether the city itself remains intact has not yet been made known, but doubtless the guns in the fortress and the ammunition stores either were moved or destroyed to prevent them falling into the hands of the Germans.

ITALIAN FORCES EXTEND POSITIONS

Rome.—The Italians extended the positions they occupied in the Brestovizza valley and on the Carso, the war office announced. Additional prisoners and much war material, including nine machine guns and five trench mortars, were captured. Austrian counter attacks at various points were repulsed.

The Italians continue their steady advance and are spreading over a larger tract of the country, especially through the Brestovizza valley and over the Basinzia plateau, capturing trench after trench and in some cases finding contingents of Austrian troops literally exhausted and suffering from thirst and hunger, their means of communication having been cut off by the well directed Italian fire.

Monte San Gabriele still is making desperate efforts at resistance, but Italian pickets are gradually creeping up the slopes, making its fall only a matter of time.

Since the beginning of the present advance the Italians have gained ground every day, while all Austrian efforts to recapture lost positions have been shattered by the energetic resistance of Cadorna's army.

108 KILLED IN AIR RAID

German Planes Drop Bombs Upon
English War Base.

London.—German aeroplanes Monday night raided the Chatham Sheerness area of England (Chatham is a British naval base and Sheerness is a military and naval depot), inflicting what were officially described as "naval casualties" totalling 107 dead and 86 wounded.

On the Isle of Thanet the raiders killed one and wounded six other persons.

"About six enemy airplanes followed the south bank of the Thames from 10:40 to 11:30," the official statement said, "our machines arose and anti-aircraft guns were in action without results."

Chatham contains immense military and naval establishments, docks, barracks, engineer schools and immense fortifications.

Sheerness is also a strongly fortified seaport, the naval arsenal of England. It likewise has great docks.

The size of the "naval casualties" reported indicates that the German raiders' bombs blew up something—possibly a ship or some of the buildings in the two great bases. Chatham is about 25 miles from London.

Drink on the Increase.

Washington.—All previous American records for consumption of whisky, cigars, cigarettes and tobacco apparently went by the board during the past fiscal year. The preliminary report of Commissioner of Internal Revenue Osborn covering the 12 months ending June 30, made public, shows record tax collections on these and other articles.

Ammunition Sent Pershing Defective.

Washington.—Creation of a board to investigate the causes of defects in cartridges sent to forces in France was recommended by Brigadier General Crozier, chief of ordnance, in a letter to Adjutant General McCain.

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FIRE-SWEPT SUMPTER IS IN NEED OF HELP

Sumpter, Ore., Aug. 27.

Friends: We are appealing to you for financial help for fire-swept Sumpter. All business houses with their stocks ranging up to thousands of dollars have been destroyed, nearly 50 homes with all the contents of clothes, bedding and furniture have been lost completely. Churches, lodges and public halls have been wiped out and little or no insurance was carried by any owing to the extreme high rate charged and at that difficult to get. Light and water plant out of business, our people are facing the winter with from six to ten feet of snow for months. Last year snow began November 1. It will soon be here. Fuel is a grave problem. The impression, unfortunately, has gone out that Sumpter is not in serious need. It is, and help must be had at once to prevent further and acute suffering.

The total losses carefully compiled by the committee appointed by the mayor of the city reaches over \$200,000. Hours of painstaking work result in the fact that from \$7,000 to \$10,000 will be required, after cutting relief to the bone, in order that the situation may be relieved. We appeal for help to you and your people. Please take the matter up at once that your help may be of great good. The governor has appealed to the state but the response is not such as we feel the people should give. Kindly make all remittances to the Citizens National bank, Baker, Oregon, which will receipt for all sums sent. Will you not come to our aid at this time?
