GOVERNMENT MAKES A REPUBLIC OF RUSSIA

Affairs of State Are Entrusted to Five Cabinet Members, With Kerensky at Head

Petrograd.—Russia has been proclaimed a republic, according to a proclamation issued by the provisional government.

The provisional government announced that all the affairs of state had been entrusted to five members of the cabinet.

Premier Kerensky's attempt to form a coalition government failed, but the crisis has been solved temporarily in the form of a cabinet reduced in size and of virtually non-party character.

After the surrender of General Korniloff and the completion of the new cabinet, Premier Kerensky in an interview said:

"Announce that the Korniloff adventure now is completely at an end and there is no prospect whatever of his adherents or of other parties attempting to revive it. Virtually all the chief movers in the revolt are in our hands and the matter may be considered settled.

"Our immediate problems are political and I hope they will be settled satisfactorily and peaceably. We must think of reorganization at home and the conduct of the war."

An extraordinary tribunal will be appointed to try the officers arrested in connection with the Korniloff revolution. The sessions will be open to the public and the chief witnesses will be Deputy Lvoff, who acted as Korniloff's intermediary in demanding the resignation of Kerensky; Acting War Minister Savinkoff and Filonenko, commissioner of the provisional government at the headquarters.

drill down very satisfactory. We are not afraid of criticism now when the colonel comes about the battery during drill, because we have splendid team work. The last time Colonel Ellis gave us battery inspection he remarked to me that my men all seemed to understand their business.

Walter Landwehr enlisted and was assigned to Sixth company and was at once put on the time range correction device, an instrument on which is computed the corrected range which is sent to the range setter at the gun. This is a very important position. He is now an expert at the board. He will be made a corporal. Landwehr has had three years' drill at O. A. C. and is a good soldier. There are a number of young men whom I have my eye upon with a view of promoting them as soon as there is an opening.

We have night drill each Thursday night, and it is very interesting to see the search lights working on the targets and shipping in the harbor and on the ocean front. Last Sunday my wife and I went over to Fort Columbia to visit Captain Elkins and other friends of ours among the officers, several of whom have their wives at the fort. While we were coming home we had a lovely view of the steamer Great Northern coming across the bar and up the majestic Columbia, and right while we were watching her cross the bar a woman jumped overboard. We did not see her do the act, but she left a note and took that time to do the deed as the steamer neared port. The body was not recovered, as the terrific current and undertow carry the bodies out to sea.

"Spud" Teeters was ordered today by the fort commander to work on the Y. M. C. A. building and was glad of the opportunity to do a bit of work to help with the completion of the building. Ralph has made good as a soldier and is now up for appointment as a corporal. Men are to be detailed from each company to help with the building until it is finished, as the rainy season is close upon us and the boys are all anxious to have the building completed so they will have a club room to their liking. It will be a great comfort during the long winter evenings, and it now looks as if we might stay here most of the winter. I see Victor Chambers occasionally. He is in a mortar battery company and is a quarter of a mile from our battery. Vic is a good soldier and is well liked, not only by the boys, but, judging from the picture he and a "piece of calico" made on the beach at Seaside a couple of weeks ago, I think the fair sex also admires him. Victor blushes beautifully, and he did so on that occasion. I don't blame him. I myself was young once—and am not so darned old yet.

Our company won a box of cigars by being the first company on the parade grounds last Friday morning when all companies were ordered by the war department to take positions near the post flag staff immediately after reveille (5:45 a. m.) and at the playing by the band of The Star Spangled Banner to salute the flag, it being the anniversary of the birth of the national anthem. TESTED RECIPES

Beef Turnovers—Chop the tough end of the flank steak with the dressing finely and moisten slightly with brown sauce; add an extra seasoning of salt, pepper, one tablespoonful of mushroom catsup, a few chopped button mushrooms and a little minced parsley. Roll out on a pastry board a thin sheet of pastry, cut into rounds and place two tablespoonfuls of mince in the center of each. Form into turnovers, crimp the edges of paste together, brush over with beaten egg mixed with cold water, and bake in a quick oven until crisp and brown.

Cheese Souffle—Grate a half pound of cheese; mix a dessert spoonful of flour in a cupful of milk; beat four whole eggs and add first the cheese and then the flour and milk mixture. Season with pepper and salt and put all into a mold. Let it cook in a saucepan of boiling water for an hour and a half. Then at the end of that time put it in the oven for half an hour.
