RECORD OF EVERY LANE COUNTY SOLDIER KEPT

A record of every soldier or sailor who
has entered the service from Lane
county will be kept and some of the data is
already compiled, according to Colonel
J. M. Williams, chairman of the patri-
otic committee of the Eugene chamber
of commerce.

Colonel Williams has obtained the
names and other data concerning the
members of the three coast artillery
companies of this county, will obtain the
names of the Lane county men in Cap-
tain J. E. Kuykendall's ambulance com-
pany now at American Lake, and as far
as possible will obtain the names of all
Lane county men who have enlisted in
the regular service through the local re-
cruiting offices. Other names will be
obtained through relatives and friends
of the young men who are now in the
service.

This will be a permanent roll and will
be kept in a loose-leaf ledger, each name
on a separate sheet, so that the sheet
may be taken out at any time and the
record of the man added to as the war
progresses.
