What this has meant to my family during my absence they can not know, but I do.

What I am about to say is not a defense; it is an explanation.

At midnight of September 14, I was awakened in my room in New York City and handed a telegram stating that the Eugene Commercial Club had demanded my dismissal from the Oregon legislature and the state university because of my connection with the peace conference held in Chicago. I could not understand how this demand might be made because of a difference in opinion, but I did not see until I arrived in Portland Saturday, a copy of the resolution itself, and I was shocked and pained beyond expression, when I read that I had been found guilty of disloyalty to my country.

Isolation, or dismissed from the state university, these and all other questions are as nothing compared to the question of my loyalty to my government.

Never did I think that I would be called upon to assert my patriotism. Even now under the necessity of it, it seems absurd. But the necessity is here and I am forced to speak.

This is my country, not as perfect as it should be, not as perfect as I want to help make it, but it is my country, and I love it. This is my government, not a perfect government, far, far from it, but the best that struggling man has yet devised, and it is mine, mine to help make better and mine to defend and support. This is my war, not of my making, not of my choosing, but it is mine. There was a time when it was the privilege and the duty of every citizen to keep us out or lead us in, as he saw the light. But that time passed when war was declared. We must not look back, we must look forward. We must carry it through until our cause is won.

I am against the German government as it now is; its form, its purpose and its method. I have always been, I will always be. And I am against those same forms, those same purposes and those same methods, under different and softer names wherever they exist.

I am opposed to peace at any price. The only peace I want is a righteous peace, not other than an enduring peace. I am not willing that this war shall stop until the doom of Prussian militarism is sealed, in every land and on every sea.

But I am not willing to continue this war any longer than is necessary, and if it is continued one day longer, even in the name of patriotism, of liberty or of God, it will be a crime in which I will not knowingly take part.

And because I believe these things, I attended a meeting of citizens called the People's Council of America for Democracy and Terms of Peace held in Chicago.

Because I believe these things, I attended a meeting of citizens in opposi-

tion to the People's Council held in Madison Square Garden, New York.

Because I believe these things, I laid before administration officials, at their invitation, in Washington, information which they wanted, and which I could not have secured except through the very experiences for which I have been condemned.

Finally a word about our president. No matter what we may have thought once, we must follow him now. This is the only way out. We must follow him, but not blindly. We can not and we must not shift all the load onto him; we must bear our part. And I think we can bear our part not by closing our minds against the problems that do and will continue to exist, but by honestly keeping our eyes open in the quest for truth in these things; for the truth is the light, the one light, which must guide us through war, and finally point the way to peace.
