**O. & C. TAX MONEY
IS PAID TO SHERIFF**

Oswald West, former governor of Oregon, who has been acting as special agent for the government in the Oregon and California land grant tax matter, arrived in Eugene Tuesday and delivered to Sheriff J. C. Parker a draft for the amount due Lane county from the government as taxes on the grant lands.

Lane county's share is \$277,560, and it is expected that after the school and road districts receive their share, due for special district taxes, and after the money is apportioned to the different funds in the county, there will be \$100,000 or more left in the general fund.

As Lane county is already out of debt, this amount will remain idle until the county court decides what it shall be used for. It is probable that an addition to the courthouse will be built with a portion of the money, but further than that the court has not announced what disposition will be made of the money.

**FIRE DEPARTMENT GOES
ON TOUR OF THE CITY
TO DISCOVER FIRE**

Laddies Have Apparatus Ready When Not Needed, but Can't Use It When It Is Needed.

The fire department was called out three times yesterday, after several weeks without any fires. At the first two of the fires it was not necessary to use the apparatus, and at the last fire, at the Chambers mill, where the apparatus could have been used to good advantage, it was not possible to use it.

The first alarm was turned in about 11 o'clock. Because of a misunderstanding in receiving the word as to where the fire was located, the firemen hunted the city over and not until they had put their apparatus away did they learn that it was at the B. Pleunard home, where a small hole was burned in the roof. The second alarm was turned in shortly after 2 o'clock from the warehouse of the Cottage Grove Flour mills at the depot. Water was soon on the flames and within a few moments after alarm was turned in all danger was over. The third alarm, from the Chambers mill, was turned in shortly after 7 o'clock.
