Side Lights on Manual Training.

There seems to be a prevailing idea among a good many good people that industrial education is of little or no value. For instance, when a boy has completed the sixth grade, at the length of eight, he should be able to cast about him and from the knowledge gained by taking manual training once a week for 34 or 36 weeks secure a job that will pay him a living wage. He will admit that this is the extreme. There are a good many people who go to the extremes. So then it is not consistent that some extremists be found everywhere!

This is only one of the enemies that is constantly on the trail of manual training.

Why does this enemy exist? Where does it exist? How long will it exist? It exists because people are untrained. It exists in every town that has not yet outgrown its infant clothes in regard to the education of the individual. It will remain in existence just as long as people maintain the idea that the manual training course in any public school is maintained to produce tradesmen and skilled workers. This may be another extreme.

If manual training does not produce types of workmen, what then does it produce? A fair question. Who can answer? Does the study of history produce historians? Does the study of grammar produce grammarians? Does the study of spelling produce correct spellers? Does the study of geography produce geologists?

Let us assume that manual training is the A, B, C of industry. A few schools introduce shop work in the sixth grade in their curriculum. Cottage Grove does not go quite so far but takes what it believes to be a safe course. Sixth grade pupils (boys) meet with the manual training teacher once a week. On these occasions a subject of interest, both to the boy and the community, is taken up for discussion. Of course the interest is varied. Varying as the individual varies. In the two weeks just past one week has been devoted to fly traps and fly swatters. Not only this, but some

consideration was given to the use and destruction of the so-called "pesky fly." What one fly could produce, the damage done, and other things concerning the fly. A few traps were made, some good, some not so good. All would catch flies.

The purpose of the lesson was twofold: (1) To study a little about a fly. (2) That the boy be given an opportunity to do something worth while, to produce something by his own efforts. And we must not forget that production by our own efforts is the key to self-preservation.

This week boys will make and fly kites—produced by their own efforts.

So then, in season and out of season, boys will be asked to produce something useful either to themselves, their home or their pets, their friends or their enemies. Parents are asked to cooperate in any and all ways possible so that our young America may know that schools have more than "reading," "ritin" and "tributative."

As for seventh and eighth grades, a fixed outline is available for them. Correct methods of handling tools, accompanied by a study of materials and tools used in their relation to industry. Drawings are produced and studied in relation to the work done. Principles of construction are studied. Invention and design are invited.

In general the scheme holds to class instruction, at the same time making allowance for the individuality of the worker.
