TESTED RECIPES

Apple Trifle—Peel sour apples of good quality, cut into quarters, remove cores, and boil in a little water, shaking them occasionally. When soft, pass through a coarse sieve and sweeten to taste. Put the apples on the bottom of a fireproof dish and cover with a mixture made by pounding nine large rusks and adding to the crumbs six ounces of white sugar. Then pour evenly over crumbs mixture of six ounces of melted butter, and put in the oven until a rich brown crust is formed. When cold cover all with sweetened whipped cream. Stewed rhubarb may be used instead of apples.

Cookies—Four ounces of flour, four ounces of butter, two spoonfuls of sugar, some currants and finely cut almonds. Cream the butter, and dredge in the other ingredients, stirring well. Put the paste in small balls on buttered sheets, and bake in a moderately hot oven.
