1917 WILL LIVE AS THE YEAR OF LONG DROUGHT

Heavy Rain Friday Night Is Second
Since Latter Part of June.

Nineteen seventeen will probably live
in the memories of the citizens of the
Webfoot state as the year of the long
drought. Since the latter part of June
until Friday night, there had been but
one rainfall in the Cottage Grove coun-
try, and that was not sufficient to soak
the ground after three months of hot
weather without a drop of rain. The
rain Friday night gave the ground a
good soaking and with that which has
since fallen has put the ground in good
shape for fall plowing.
The timber in the mountains had
again become very dry and a number of
fires had broken out. They were com-
pletely extinguished by the rain Friday
night.
People who came here from the east
last spring expecting rain every day of
the year were agreeably disappointed
with four months of continued sunshine
and have found that Oregon has been
lied about quite a bit anyway as con-

cerns its rainfall, which is not greater
than that of eastern states.
