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ALL DRAFTED MEN SUBJECT TO NEW REGULATIONS

ALL EXEMPTIONS OR DIS- CHARGES FROM SERVICE ARE CANCELLED

Every Man Subject to Draft Will Be
Required to Give All Information
Through Medium of Elaborate
Questionnaire.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 20.—Let every man who is registered under the selective service law pay careful heed to the changes that have been ordered by the government in the method of selecting men for military service.

These changes affect every man subject to draft without exception.

The new plan goes into effect on December 15, but preparations for putting it into effect will begin all over the United States on December 1.

At that time all exemptions or discharges from military service under the draft will be automatically cancelled. Exemptions hereafter will be based on an improved system whereby the government will have exact knowledge of every registered man and his affairs.

The basic principle of the new system is that those men are to be taken first who have no persons dependent upon them.

Under this classification come single men, married men whose wives support them, married men who have habitually failed to support their families, or whose families are independent of them for support.

Men in this class will be subject to call first. They will be listed under what will be known as Class 1.

The married men and those with persons other than their wives or children immediately dependent on them for support, as well as those whose work is necessary to industries essential to the war, including agriculture, will be listed in other classes. There will be five classes in all.

The effect of classification in classes below Class 1 will be to grant a temporary discharge from the draft, for men in these classes will not be called until the class or classes above theirs have been exhausted.

But before this system can be put into effect, information must be gathered on which to make the classification of each man.

To obtain this information and to compile it afterward, the government has prepared books called "Questionnaires."

The questionnaires contain questions covering every phase of a man's occupation, his income, that of persons he claims to be dependent on him, his family relations, his business, his health.

Each registered man must answer one of these questionnaires in full.

A questionnaire will be mailed by the local board to each registered man direct to the address on his registration card or as that address may be changed by notice of change of address filed therewith, within the next two or three weeks.

He will have seven days in which to make the required answers and return the questionnaire to the board.

Failure to answer will automatically cancel his rights to exemption and will put him in Class 1.

In order to fully protect the rights of every registered man, and to help him make out his questionnaire, lawyers will be at the headquarters of the board to advise and assist him without charge.

MAMMOTH COTTAGE GROVE TUBERS WEIGH TWO POUNDS EACH

Y. M. C. A. FUND IS 100 PER CENT OVER QUOTA

TOTAL RAISED HERE FOR SOLDIERS WILL GO TO \$2200 OR OVER

Cottage Grove "went over the top" in its contributions to the Army and Navy Y. M. C. A. fund. The total subscriptions reported up to yesterday were \$1994.31, but the report at that time was incomplete. This amount does not include the school contributions of over \$200. The total will be \$2200 or over, or an oversubscription of nearly 100 per cent. Cottage Grove's apportionment for the war work exclusively was \$1250, although it was asked to raise \$1250 additional for the Eugene Y. M. C. A. No attempt was made to raise funds for the latter purpose and all the money raised here will go exclusively for the army and navy work. All contributions will be collected by Worth Harvey, cashier, at the First National bank, and the money will be sent direct to state headquarters.

The auditing committee cannot complete its work until all receipt books are in, and those who have not turned in their books are urged to send them at once to Worth Harvey.

The books will first be audited here. They will then be sent to the state committee and audited by a public accountant, after which they will go to New York, to be audited by the war council.

Cottage Grove's oversubscription is probably greater than that of any other city in the county and is away ahead of that of Eugene, which raised but very little over its apportionment, due to the fact that the campaign for the local Y. M. C. A. was conducted at the same time.

COTTAGE GROVE IS TO HAVE CHAUTAUQUA DURING 1918

Chautauqua Fans Sign With Rad- cliffe System for a 3-Day Session Next Summer

Cottage Grove will have a chautauqua next year despite the fact that its contract with the Ellison-White system was repudiated by the Ellison-White people. Chautauqua boosters of the city have signed a contract with the Radcliffe system for a 3-day session in the late spring or early summer. Talent equal to any that has heretofore appeared here is promised and the programs will be much the same as those which Cottage Grove has heretofore enjoyed. Every program will be a complete change, the same lecturer and the same amusement company appearing in the afternoon and evening programs of the same day. There will be a complete change of lecturers and entertainers each day.

Season tickets will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children.

POWDER SALES ARE NOT STOPPED

Clearing of Land and Blasting May Go Forward Without Fear of Inter- ference by the Law.

A few days ago a dispatch printed in the newspapers concerning the having possession of explosives, while not intentionally so, was misleading. It stated that "after November 15 any person who does not have a license issued by the federal government showing the purpose for which the explosives were to be used, will at once be arrested and fined up to \$5000, or sent to prison for one year, or both, if the circumstances warrant."

This has caused many engaged in clearing land to arrange to drop the law. There is no necessity for this as they can still get explosives and have them in their possession without fear of the law. The law was passed so as to permit the government to keep track of all explosives and prevent their being obtained by enemies of the country for improper use.

For the administration of the explosive law, approved October 6, the bureau of mines is appointing licensing agents in all parts of the country and is sending them the necessary application blanks, license forms, etc. As fast as licenses are designated and notices given to the public, licenses will be issued in all localities. Until such time, explosives may be sold and purchased as usual.

LAST BIRD SHIPMENT GOES NEXT TUESDAY

The next shipment of chickens to the soldier boys at Fort Stevens will be made next Tuesday so that the birds may reach the boys in time for their Thanksgiving dinner. Owing to the scarcity of hens, this is likely to be the last shipment made to the boys at the fort, and the cooperation of all those having chickens is asked.

Washington Champs Challenge.

The Goldendale football team, claiming the championship of western Washington, has accepted the recent challenge of the Cottage Grove eleven. Cottage Grove did not intend, however, to take in quite so much territory, and will confine itself for the present to meeting Willamette valley teams. Should it be successful in defeating the Oregon teams, it may talk about meeting teams from other states.

Challenges have also been received from Oregon City, Brownsville, Forest Grove and Mt. Angel, and one of these teams will probably be here on Thanksgiving day.

Tells of Service in Europe.

A letter in the Du Bois (Neb.) Press, written by Sergeant H. F. Krueger, son of a native of Germany, now with the aviation detachment of the American expeditionary forces in Italy, and a nephew of V. O. and W. P. Huff, of this city, tells some interesting things about the service in Europe. Sergeant Krueger and the expedition of which he was a part, landed safely in England and were soon transported to France, where he was trained by French aviators and was later sent to Italy for training by the Italians, who have the best bombing machines. He reports having seen 30 machines in the air at one time. The welcome given the Americans at all points was hearty and they were escorted into Italy by a squadron of airplanes. The party of which Sergeant Krueger was a member was the first American party to enter Italy. The Americans find themselves objects of curiosity wherever they go.

FRUITFUL LORANE IS TO HAVE WINTER OUTLET

County Court Promises Crusher and Residents Will Levy a Tax of Ten Mills

At last the fruitful Lorane country is to have a winter outlet. The county court has promised a combined committee from the section affected and from Cottage Grove that a rock crusher would be placed on the road next year and the taxpayers of the road district have called a meeting to vote a 10-mill tax.

The road within three miles of this city has usually been in pretty fair condition and the Lorane people have improved and rocked the road to the mountain, but several miles remained between these two stretches that was almost impassable during the wet months, and even the road at this end is now in bad condition. The road to Eugene has been in an equally impassable condition, so that Lorane people have been practically shut in during the winter season.

LATHAM ROAD NEARS COMPLETION

On Account of Work Yet to Be Done in Douglas County, Canyon Will Remain Impassable.

The work on the Latham Divide road, which takes the place of several miles of the worst road on Pacific highway, will be completed this week, thanks to the fine weather which has permitted the carrying on of the work. The new road not only takes the place of a bad stretch of road but several hills are avoided and the road now runs in almost a straight line from here to the head of Pass Creek canyon.

Travel through the canyon will be impossible this winter, as there is a stretch of some two miles which has been graded but upon which no rock will be placed until next year. This work is being done by the Douglas county court. The Lane county court expects to do some work at the head of the canyon next spring, and when the work done by Douglas county is completed there will be a good winter road through the entire canyon.

STATE VETERINARIAN TO TEST NO MORE CATTLE

To Carry Out Law Court Must Appoint County Veterinarian.

Word has just been received by County Agricultural Agent N. S. Robb from the state veterinarian to the effect that the state will be unable to test any more cows in Lane county.

It was the intent of the legislature that each county should appoint a county veterinarian to look after this county testing work, says Dr. Lytle. He further states that the exemption provided in the law covers only the supplying of milk and does not cover butter, according to a recent ruling by the assistant attorney general.

This word from the state veterinarian explains why there has been so much delay in the testing of cows, and further that the office of the county agent is not to blame for the delay. The county agent merely assisted in sending in the names in groups, and got more office of the state veterinarian's office apportioned to Lane county than to any other county in the state.

Brings Samples of Fine Potatoes.

S. K. Lewis returned Monday morning from Klamath Falls. Wallace Beaver, who accompanied him there, remained for a further visit of two or three weeks. Mr. Lewis brought samples of some of the products of the Klamath country. He had samples of Gold Coin potatoes that went 300 bushels to the acre. One sample left at The Sentinel office weighs 1½ pounds.

Grove Boy Stars in Football.

"Dot" Medley, of this city, was one of the stars in the Oregon-California game at Eugene Saturday. He was a member of the forward pass combination and was credited with two touchdowns. California, doped by the fans to have a walkaway, drew the undesirable end of a 21 to 0 score.

Cannery Completes Season's Run.

The cannery completed its season's run Friday, the last fruit put up being 302 dozen No. 10 cans of apples. The total of produce put up this year was about four car loads and a large amount of money was paid out, both for produce and labor.

Cottage Grove grange has appointed a committee of three which is ready to cooperate at any time with any other committee or committees which desire to raise funds for Sixth company's company fund.

COTTAGE GROVE HIGH FIGHTS EUGENE TO A STANDSTILL

EUGENE, DOPED TO PILE UP BIG SCORE, IS HELD TO A 7 TO 7 DRAW

With Cottage Grove high playing the best brand of football and Eugene getting the "breaks," the rival high school teams fought a drawn battle at Stouffer field Friday afternoon, the final score being 7 to 7.

Neither team had been scored on this season. The Eugene aggregation was doped to score not less than 24 points, and their opponents considerably less, but a lone touchdown, negotiated by a long forward pass followed by a tandem, Seniefe making the goal, was all the county seaters could accumulate. And with the exception of a few minutes in the final quarter, when Eugene, with four fresh men in the line, and with the further advantage of a long penalty which placed the ball within a few feet of the Cottage Grove goal, the battle was waged mostly in Eugene territory. With only about one yard to go, however, Eugene could make no headway against the Cottage Grove team's impregnable defense and lost the ball on downs. Smith promptly punting the pigskin out of the danger zone.

Cottage Grove scored the first touchdown, Smith kicking goal, in the first seven minutes of play. Eugene seemed unable to solve the attack and Cottage Grove simply backed the ball over the line. Eugene retaliated with a touchdown a few minutes later. The whistle extricated the Eugene team from a tight place at the end of the second quarter, and after that the argument settled down to a hammer and tongs affair with the home boys having a little the best of the going, but unable to score. Smith tried for a place kick, missing by a few inches. Dugan and Smith were perhaps the stars, but every man on the team was in the game every minute. NO HOARDING OR PROFITEERING ALLOWED

FEDERAL LICENSE SYSTEM WILL REGULATE ALL FOOD PRICES

Wholesalers Forbidden to Take More
Than Reasonable Profit, or to Sell
to Retailers Who Charge
Exorbitant Prices.

Under the new licensing system of the food administration, speculation in food stuffs and profiteering by wholesalers will be made practically impossible. Each wholesaler or jobber must operate under a federal license, and the number of this license must be stamped on every order, contract and other paper concerning the purchase or sale of food stuffs. Coupled with this is a federal inventory system, under which frequent reports of stock on hand must be made, and any wholesaler or jobber failing to fully comply with the requirements is subject to a fine of \$5000 or two years' imprisonment.

Only a fair profit above cost price will be allowed wholesalers, who are also forbidden to sell to any retailer who takes more than a fair margin of profit.

Through this system, any consignment of foodstuffs may be readily traced to the source of production. Wholesaler and retailer will automatically check each other and profits may be taken only twice between the consumer and the producer, these being allowed to the wholesaler and retailer, who are each limited to a fair margin, the same to be determined according to changing conditions, by federal authorities.

Licenses are now being issued, and the effects of the new system will be evident in the very near future.

Goes to Regular Army.

Mrs. L. C. Beebe has received word from her husband, Lieutenant Beebe, that he has received a commission in the regular army and will be assigned to the Thirtieth infantry, for the present stationed at Syracuse, N. Y., and which will remain in this country to give instruction to the drafted men. Mr. Beebe will be sent to Fort Leavenworth for three months before joining his regiment.

Wears Sharpshooter's Medal.

Mr. and Mrs. Edd F. Jones have received word from their son Cleve, who is with company B, United States infantry, that he has been transferred from Vancouver to American Lake. Cleve had never served in the militia or army before joining company B, but he now wears a sharpshooter's medal, the result of a keen eye and steady trigger finger developed in hunting the wild animals of the Mosby creek country.

Union Thanksgiving Service.

There will be a union Thanksgiving service at the Methodist church from 10:30 to 11:30 Thanksgiving morning. Rev. Grant will preach the sermon, and there will be special music by the choir of the Christian church.

Stores to Close Thanksgiving Day.

All the business houses of the city will close at 10 a. m. Thanksgiving day and remain closed for the remainder of the day.

LOCAL HONOR GUARDS HEAR STATE MANAGER

Miss Danforth Says Work Is a Privilege, Not a Sacrifice.

Miss Lucille Danforth, state manager of the Girls' Honor Guard, paid the local chapter a visit last night and addressed a meeting of the girls held in the high school auditorium.

Miss Danforth is traveling over the Pacific coast for the purpose of seeing the work of the Honor Guard girls and to revive the interest of the organizations in the various communities of the state. She told of the work of the girls in Washington and pointed out the fact that the girls of that state did not take to the organization of the society as quickly as did the Oregon girls but that they are now far outdoing the Oregon girls in their efforts. She also spoke of the work which the girls of the Honor Guard are doing in eastern hospitals. The organization of the Honor Guard was made before the United States had entered this war and was for the purpose of rendering social service in many ways but Miss Danforth pointed out many means by which the Honor Guard girls could now be of added service. "The girls should consider it a privilege instead of a sacrifice to do the work of the Honor Guard," said Miss Danforth. She pointed out that the greatest service which the Honor Guard girls could now perform would be to get behind the Red Cross movement and to lend every minute of their time to helping in the Red Cross work.
