Jury Awards \$340.30.

Mrs. Anna Lyons, of the Mosby creek country, will receive \$340.30 as damages for opening a county road through her farm, according to a verdict of the circuit court jury Monday night.

Mrs. Lyons was awarded \$175 damages by the viewers when they laid off the road some time ago. She claimed more than that, and appealed to the county court. The court awarded her \$250, but she was still unsatisfied and appealed to the circuit court, claiming \$2500. After a trial of the case which lasted all day Monday, and after the jury had been taken to view the premises, a verdict in the sum of \$340.30 was returned Monday night.

She alleges that there was only a little second-hand furniture and that he was cruel and abusive and finally threatened her life. She asks that he be compelled to advance \$100 suit money and that she be awarded one-third of all his property, consisting of a harness and shoe repair shop in Cottage Grove and several hundred dollars in each of the banks there. W. J. Martin, of Cottage Grove, is her attorney.

COACH ROBERT EARL ENLISTS

Is Highly Complimented in a Story in The Oregonian.
 A recent issue of The Oregonian contains the following reference to a well-known former resident of Cottage Grove: Robert Earl, Lincoln high school's football mentor, has enlisted in the ord-

nance corps of the United States Army and will leave today to take a six weeks' theoretical course at the University of Oregon. At the completion of the course "Big Bob" will be transferred to the arsenal at San Antonio, where, with "Baz" Williams and other well-known Oregon athletes, he will have a five weeks' course in practical training before taking up his regular duties in the ordnance force of the army.

Bob is 24 years of age, the youngest coach in the interscholastic league. He is a brother of Virgil Earl, Washington's coach. The younger Earl, born in Oregon, has made a fine record in athletics. A graduate of Jefferson high school, he made his letters at football, basketball and baseball each year from 1909 to 1912.

After leaving Jefferson he coached Cottage Grove and Drain eleven. He then attended the University of Oregon and played on the football team. In 1916 he again coached Cottage Grove.

Under his direction Lincoln has developed into a fast team which works like

a machine. The close of the season will find the team standing at 500 per cent, a stunt considered an impossibility at the start of the season.

Carlton Spencer May Fly.

Eugene Register: Carlton E. Spencer, graduate of the University in 1913, former president of the student body, has received an appointment to the aviation training station at San Antonio, Tex., and has returned to Portland from Stanford and is awaiting his call.

After graduation from the university, Spencer studied law at the Northwestern law school in Portland, and acted as secretary for the school at the same time. He went to Stanford to take post-graduate work.
