

# War Time Christmas Cake

1 lb. raisins, 1/2 cup beef drippings, 1 1/2 cups water, 1 3/4 cups brown sugar, 1/2 cup molasses, grated rind of 1 orange, 2 ozs. citron, grated rind of 1 lemon.

Blend the above ingredients and boil on stove 10 minutes. When cold add 4 cups flour, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 teaspoon soda dissolved in hot water, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 cup cold coffee. Sift together flour, salt and spices, put in coffee and soda and add to boiled ingredients. Bake 1 hour in moderate oven.
