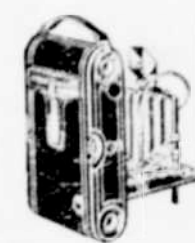

Goat Milk for Infants and Invalids.

An interesting bulletin, No. 285, has recently been issued by the agricultural experiment station at Berkeley, Calif., on "The Milk Goat in California."

In referring to the uses of goat milk it says:

"The most striking results so far secured relate to the feeding of goats' milk to infants. The station has had the opportunity of supplying this milk to a fairly large number of very young children who were in serious physical condition, due to their inability to properly digest and assimilate either modified cows' milk or any of the commercial infants' foods that were tried. In nearly all cases of this kind the physical condition of the children has been built up, and satisfactory growth has been brought about by the use of goat milk."

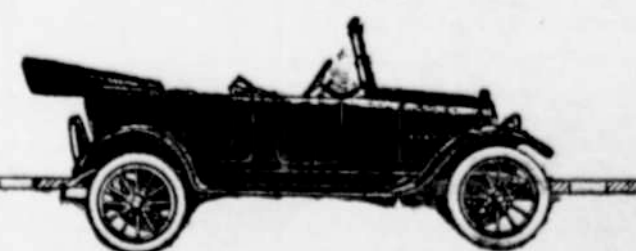
