PEACE DELEGATES AT BREST-LITOVSK

Amsterdam.—A dispatch received here from Brest-Litovsk, Russia, says that peace negotiations have begun between the central powers and Russians.

Prince Leopold, of Bavaria, as commander-in-chief of the German forces in the east, welcomed the delegates and invited Hakkli Pasha, as the senior delegate, to open the conference.

Hakkli Pasha, after an expression of a desire for a satisfactory result, declared the negotiations formally opened and proposed Dr. Von Kuehlmann as presiding officer. The German foreign minister was unanimously elected chairman.

Peace without annexations and without indemnities, the formula adopted by the German reichstag in its peace resolution last July, is the keynote of the Russian peace terms, now being discussed at Brest-Litovsk. The Russian terms have been submitted to the representatives of the central powers, who have taken them under consideration.

BRIEF WAR NEWS

In the Champagne around Moronvilliers, French troops carried out successful raids.

Speaking in the house of commons David Lloyd George, the British prime minister, said that the margin of losses at sea was narrowing. The sinkings by submarines, he declared, were decreasing, while shipbuilding was increasing.

The situation in Russia continues obscure, although such reports as are coming through indicate that the Bolshevik movement is losing ground in the face of the opposition from the Ukrainians and the followers of General Kaledines.

Further progress by the forces of General Allezby in Palestine was reported in a statement issued by the British war department. Since the Turks were driven out of Jerusalem they have been conducting guerrilla warfare in the north and east of the city, splitting up into numerous small bodies to attack British outposts.

Not only are the Italian lines holding in the Monte Asolone region, on the northern front, where a threatening salient was driven in them early last week, but practically all the lost ground was recovered. The Italians have negated much of the enemy advance, and even the German accounts of the fighting concede that for the present the aggressive is on the Italian side, with the Asolone heights the objective of repeated attacks.

Government agents have gathered evidence that certain persons in this country, many of whom are Swedes or Norwegians, have conducted a money-making scheme of transmitting letters to the northern European neutral countries or to Germany at high prices. By this means the British censorship in many cases was evaded.

Belgium Gets Two Million More. Washington.—Two million dollars lent to Belgium last week brought the total of American credits to that country to \$59,900,000. Credits to all the allied countries now aggregate \$3,887,300,000.

18 German Aviators Shot Down. Paris.—Intense aerial activity is reported by the war office. In the course of 100 combats in the air during the last few days, the French brought down 18 German machines.

Italians Hammer Teutons Back. Rome.—Enemy forces which had crossed the Piave river at Piave Vecchia have been driven back over the river, the war office announces.

Food Trust Raised Prices. War Used as Cloak to Cover Advances in Meat Stuffs, Says Heney. Washington.—That a food trust organized by the big beef barons used the war-made opportunity to boost prices, is alleged by Francis J. Heney, federal trade commission examiner.

Subject to the mandate of this secret merger, he declared, are prices of meat, poultry, dairy products, leather, grain and canned goods.

Heney promised to uncover the track of this food merger in a series of public hearings to follow the commission's sessions here last week, which disclosed the financial ledger-main by which control of the Chicago stockyards was obtained by the big packers.

Alcoholic Drinks Barred by Pershing. With the United States Army in France.—General Pershing issued a general order absolutely forbidding American soldiers from buying or accepting any alcoholic beverages except light wine and beer.

GERMANS REPORTED NEAR PETROGRAD

Teutons Are Pushing Commercial Interests to Their Utmost Limit.

London.—Many news dispatches from Petrograd speak of the supposed impending arrival of the Germans there, which is said to be the universal topic of discussion in the city, but every one seems to have a different version. Many of these stories center around reported concentration near the capital of a large force of released German war prisoners, to whom arms are being handed over, according to some of the reports. Referring to these rumors, the Petrograd correspondent of the Post says that unquestionably thousands of German war prisoners are flocking towards Petrograd from all parts of Russia, but he believes that at present a more important phase of the situation is the active and thorough manner in which the Germans have been pushing trade with Russian since the frontier was opened.

He reports they are making the most of a commercial opportunity such as the world has never seen before, inasmuch as Russian industries are nearly dead and the Germans have no competition.

The Germans have refused to admit M. Inovieff, a close associate of Nikolai Lenin, and other Bolsheviks whom the soldiers' and workmen's delegates wished to send in to spread their doctrines in the German army. They also declined to admit Trotsky's newspaper, printed in German, for army propaganda.

It is reported that the Germans are moving troops from the Russian northern and western fronts to the south-western and Roumanian fronts.

Headquarters of the Italian Army in Northern Italy.—In a succession of brilliant attacks the Italians succeeded in dislodging the enemy from a great part of Monte Asolone and driving him back more than two-thirds of a mile along a three-mile front.

The enemy's occupation of Asolone was regarded as a serious menace, because it gave him partial control of San Lorenzo valley, leading to the plain and Bassano.

Had the enemy been able to hold it and capture Monte Coston, between it and Monte Grappa, which latter is the enemy's objective as the completely dominating position of the entire range, this key position would have been seriously menaced.

Their rebuff at this important point, however, keeps the Austro-German forces not only at a considerable distance from the plain they are seeking, but makes their progress toward it extremely difficult now that the weather conditions, unfavorable for several days, are rapidly increasing in severity.

SPY TRAFFIC DISCOVERED. Invisible Ink and Code System Used in Conveying Information.

Washington.—An extensive traffic in written communications to Germany, Austria and the northern European neutrals, involving use of invisible ink and code system, has been discovered and stopped by customs officials within the last few weeks, according to treasury officials.

The traffic, it was disclosed, was carried on largely by Swedish ship and marine men.

Scores of persons are now under surveillance, and a number of arrests probably will be made soon. Evidence that the channel of communications has been open since the United States entered the war has been uncovered.
