BOLSHEVIKI DISSOLVE RUSSIAN ASSEMBLY

Action Will Result In Internal Strife, Is Opinion of Many.

Petrograd.—Russia's constituent assembly had been in existence but a few hours before it was dissolved early Sunday by the executive committee of the congress of workmen and soldiers' delegates. It is reported it will be succeeded by the workmen and soldiers' congress, which has been supporting the Lenin government. Dissolution came after the Bolsheviki adherents had been defeated in attempts to gain control of the assembly.

Lenine himself introduced the dissolution decree in the assembly and in a 90-minute speech lauded the soviet deputies as representing the highest power of democracy in the world. He said he considered the most resolute action which the decree proposed as the only means remaining—the Russian people otherwise were doomed.

The constituent assembly opened on January 18 and gave a majority to the socialist revolutionists of the right—the party of Kerensky, Tchernoff and Avksentieff.

A. I. Shingoroff, minister of finance in the Kerensky cabinet, and Professor F. E. Kokoshkine, state controller under Kerensky, were murdered in their beds in the Marine Hospital.

M. Shingoroff and Professor Kokoshkine were removed recently to the hospital from the fortress of St. Peter and St. Paul because of illness.

CHAMBERLAIN FAVORS UNIVERSAL TRAINING

New York.—The National Security league paid tribute here to Senator George E. Chamberlain, of Oregon, and Representative Julius Kahn, of California. At a luncheon given in their honor the speakers referred to the efforts of the two statesmen in congress in the interests of national defense.

Senator Chamberlain, in discussing the military policy of the United States, advocated the adoption of universal military training. He pointed out that this system is fair to all—the high and the low, the rich and the poor, the professional man and the artisan.

Representative Kahn denounced the pacifists. "The strong arm of the government," he said, "should reach out and get these people. A few prompt trials and a few quick hangings would prove most salutary at this time."

Representative Kahn was followed by Theodore Roosevelt, who said: "Back Mr. Chamberlain; back Mr. Kahn in seeing that every hindrance of having these men supported as they should be supported by this nation is taken away."

EAST HEATLESS MONDAY

Retail Establishments Except Drug and Food Stores Close.

Washington.—The eastern half of the United States observed Monday generally as a holiday, the first of 10 heatless Mondays decreed by the government to conserve coal and clear congestion from the railroads.

Although the closing order, promulgated by Fuel Administrator Garfield, goes no further than to forbid the use of fuel for heating, fuel administration officials expected business to cease, and Dr. Garfield issued a direct request that all retail establishments, except food and drug stores, close their doors for the day.

Food stores which, in the original order were permitted to remain open only half the day, were granted a special dispensation under which they may sell goods throughout the day.

Chinese Fire on U. S. Gunboat.

Washington.—Firing by Chinese on the United States gunboat Monocacy, which resulted in killing one American sailor and badly wounding two others, was made the subject of protest to the Chinese government by American Minister Reisch.

The attack on the American vessel took place, according to official advice, on the Yangtze river, 50 miles above Yochow. It is believed revolutionary forces were responsible and the Chinese government will be called on to run down and punish the offenders.

Washington Man With Pershing Slain.

Washington.—General Pershing reported Corporal Walter Roberts, infantry, killed in action January 29. No details of the engagement were given. His mother, Mrs. Kate Roberts, lives at Hartline, Wash.

18,000 Army Officers to Be Advanced.

Washington.—Eighteen thousand temporary second lieutenants in the regular army were made eligible for promotion to first lieutenants in the national army by a war department order.

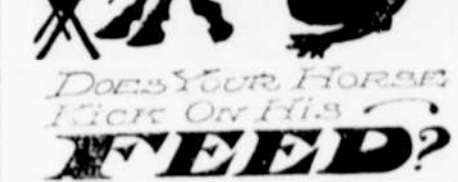
