FINDS SHEEP ARE PROFITABLE

That there is big money in sheep raising is evident from the results obtained by Jacob Runk, who lives on the Eugene-Lorane road 15 miles southwest of Eugene.
Mr. Runk a year ago bought 33 head of sheep and six of these were wethers. During the year he sold 13 of them on account of the high price of feed. Including the 13 old sheep which he sold Mr. Runk realized the sum of \$600 from his flock in a year's time.
The fleece from the sheep averaged 10 pounds to the animal and sold for 65 cents a pound. The six yearling wethers were shipped to Portland and they netted \$95 after all expenses were paid and the lambs sold for \$10 each.
Mr. Runk is a firm believer in diversified farming, and says that all farmers should have a flock of sheep and own other livestock during these times of high prices for meat of all kinds.
