Soldier's Funeral Is Held

Junction City, Ore., Feb. 12.—The funeral of Earl Llewellyn, the first Junction City boy to give his life in the service of his country, was held Monday afternoon at Miller's chapel. Fully 500 people gathered to do honor to his memory, all the business houses in the city closing for the hour of the funeral and the public schools being dismissed.

Earl Llewellyn was a native Lane county boy, having been born near here in 1896, and having lived here until he enlisted last spring in the 29th aero squadron stationed at Waco, Texas, at which place he died February 2, of a complication of diseases, having contracted the measles followed by pneumonia and scarlet fever. His father and brother reside near this city.

The funeral was conducted by Rev. H. E. Burke and the front of the chapel was banked with beautiful floral offerings. The casket itself was draped in the flag for which he had given his life.

PLANS FOR COURT HOUSE ADDITION SOON COMPLETE

All Officers to Be More Comfortably Situated After Change.

Plans for the new addition to the courthouse and for the rearrangement of the offices in the old part of the building were again studied by members of the county court last week and a few suggestions were made to the architect.

Judge G. E. Skipworth, of the circuit court, is very much pleased with the plans for the new circuit court room, which is to be located on the second floor of the new addition on the north side of the building. It will have a seating capacity of 300 persons, which is more than the present court room holds. The judge's offices will be adjoining the court room conveniently and the jury rooms will be close by. There will also be provided rooms for witnesses, who will not be compelled to sit out in the hallway as at present when waiting to be called to testify before the grand jury or at a trial.

It has been definitely settled that the county clerk will occupy the office room which the sheriff now occupies, besides the present county court room, and the sheriff will be moved to the present office of the clerk.

The county superintendent, who is now housed in rooms down town, will occupy the rooms now used by the district attorney, and the assessor, who is in a room partitioned off from the old circuit court room, will occupy rooms on the first floor of the new addition. The other county officials will be conveniently located, according to the plans.

The county court will soon accept the plans and it is proposed to immediately afterwards advertise for bids for the construction of the addition.
