#### Dr. Banks Tells of Waste of Fuel and Foodstuffs.

"In the east churches, schools and various institutions and places of business were closed for the lack of fuel, with many thousands of families suffering from cold, handreds dying of pneumonia and still others literally freezing to denth, the brewere's were allowed to run full blast, day." Dr. Banks said that in spite of O. H. Heine. the car shortage thousands of cars were being used continuously for transporting the raw material to the breweries and to distribute the finished product Dr. Banks has two sons in the service and feels keenly the crisis through which we are passing. He believes evervoke should do his best to conserve food and protests vehemently against the food waste by breweries in America, England and France.

#### High Price for Blackberries,

Eugene, Ore., March 9.-A small family will be able to make from \$12 to \$15 a day picking evergreen blackberries, which grow wild in the Willamette valley, during the coming season, according to a prediction of W. R. Scott, manager of the Linn and Benton County Fruit Growers' association,

"He estimates that the price paid this year will be about four cents a pound, as compared with three cents, the high mark in previous years.

"There is an unlimited market for thousands of acres of these berries,' Mr. Scott stated. "They are being set out in the Puyallup, Washington, valley, where they have not grown wild as in the Willamette valley. The evergreen berry is more popular with the buyers than any other variety of black-

#### PRICE FIXING FOR ALL KINDS OF GRAIN URGED

Officials Say Action Would Result in Lowering Price of Substitutes.

Chicago, March 9 .- Government regulation of all grain prices and fixing of a high maximum wheat price is needed to force farmers to dispose of their grain holdings and increase their acreage, according to food administration officials here today.

With a maximum wheat price, these officials say, the government could control the market through its large buying powers. Through the proposed regulations, the food administration could coerce farmers to market their grain and the price of wheat substitutes could Thursday last in favor of the plaintiff be lowered,

Farmers show no inclination to dispose of their grain at present prices. An Illinois farmer, appealed to by the Cooper and Churchill in the justice administration, refused to sell 30,000 court here for the recovery of that sum bushels of wheat at the \$2.20 government price.

The report of the buraeu of crop estimates showing that 111,272,000 bushels of wheat is held by farmers in the face of a 49,923,000 bushel shortage in the visible supply, emphasizes the need of radical measures, say officials here.
