COTTAGE GROVE IS BEST ORGANIZED SECTION OF THE COUNTY

Complete Record to Be Made of What | The Sentinel was presented with two Every Citizen Has Done for His Country in Every Drive So Far Put On ..

Never in any drive has the enthusiasm been shown that is being shown by the workers in the third liberty loan drive. This was demonstrated at the rally Monday afternoon, when farmers left their plows, doctors their patients and business men their customers in order to attend. Of fifteen districts in the Cottage Grove country, fourteen were represented at the meeting. The magnificent address by Professor Schafer, of the University of Oregon, well repaid all for the effort put forth in attending. At this meeting complete plans for the campaign were outlined,

During this week a complete census of the entire Cottage Grove country is being made. The census is being taken on cards which will be used as a meanof determining that no person is over looked. When the campaign is com pleted there will be a complete record on each card as to how much such person has subscribed in this campaign, how much in previous campaigns, and how much for other war activities. There will also be a complete record of any reasons given for not buying liberty bonds, as well as a record of whether or not the person is able to buy liberty bonds.

In this campaign the country districts will be covered as never before and it is becoming evident that the country people are taking a greater interest than ever before in the conduct of the war. In the city campaign there will be an organization in imitation of a military organization, with a general, colonels, captains, high privates in the rear rank, etc. The city will be divided into districts, as will also the entire surround ing country.
