## EUGENE VIGILANTES HOLD MIDNIGHT PARTY

Two Hundred Citizens Escort Loafer to Northern Border of County.

Junction City, Ore., March 20.—Two hundred vigilantes of Lane county, in automobiles, passed through here at 10:30 tonight, having in custody Jake Spores, aged 36, who was taken from a lodging house in Eugene as an undesirable citizen.

Their destination was said to be the northern border of Lane county, and talk of tar and feathers was rife among members of the party.

Spores had been warned several times by citizens of Eugene to go to work or join the army, but showed no inclination to do either, and had made defiant remarks and, it is alleged, unpatriotic and treasonable utterances.

The long train of more than 50 autos moving rapidly northward on the river road in the darkness attracted much attention, and was augmented from time to time by other cars joining the party.

## CLOCKS OF NATION TO GO AHEAD ONE HOUR

Washington, March 18.—Uncle Sam is going to get up one hour earlier to beat the kaiser, beginning March 31.

Asked today if they would observe the new daylight saving law, now awaiting the president's signature to make it effective at 2 a. m. March 31, government department heads were united in saying the new rule would be observed.

Everyone, from President Wilson down, is in on the play for more daylight effort. The White House and all departments will start operations for the day, according to the government clocks, moving forward an hour. And all anticipate great efficiency, more pep, and more time at home with a garden or other win-the-war measures.

Before retiring on the night of March 30, move the hands of your watches and clocks forward one hour. Move them back an hour before retiring on the night of October 26. Meantime forget it.

## POTATOES SUBSTITUTE FOR FLOUR IN OREGON

Portland, March 16.—Beginning today, potatoes are recognized by the federal food administration as wheat flour substitute in Oregon and purchase of a pound of potatoes can be credited in buying a pound of flour. The order is temporary, owing to the abundance of potatoes and scarcity of other wheat flour substitutes.

Portland, Ore., March 18.—It takes four pounds of potatoes to equal one pound of other wheat flour substitute, the federal food administration's local offices announced today. Furthermore, potatoes can represent only 50 per cent of a flour purchaser's wheat substitutes.

To buy 50 pounds of flour, the purchaser can buy 100 pounds of potatoes to make up 25 pounds of the required substitutes but the remaining 25 pounds must be of other approved substitutes.
