For points tend to appear blurred to him and the time of day by a distant clock might be easily read at six and the minute hand ENTIRELY DISAPPEAR at six fifteen.

In some astigmatic eyes the focusing muscles are able to overcome this symptom, in others it becomes at once apparent if the person looks at black radiating lines or "spokes" which then appear unequally blurred.
