HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS OFF FOR WHOLE AFTERNOON

Beginning next Monday morning a new schedule will be put into effect in the high school. Those pupils who wish to do so may take up their studies at 8:30 and will complete the day's work at 12:20. This will give them the same number of periods in school that they now have and will give them the entire afternoon for employment. They will have to do part of their studying at home.

Many pupils would have had to stop their studies entirely but for this arrangement, it being necessary for a number to help on the farms and others having afternoon employment. About 60 pupils will take advantage of the new schedule. The teachers will be required to teach an extra period for the benefit of those pupils who do not take advantage of the new schedule but have expressed a willingness to do this in order to assist with the war work. Plans similar to this have been adopted in other schools. This plan has been approved by 98 per cent of the patrons of the school and was adopted by the school board at its meeting last night.

A meeting of the executive committee and advisory board of Cottage Grove branch was held Thursday, April 18. After discussion of the temporary scarcity of materials, it was decided to make the following changes in our work for the present:

At headquarters the days for sewing will be Thursdays and Saturdays. The store and military department will be open each afternoon, and from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. Saturdays.

The West Side sewing room and auxiliaries of the branch will meet every other week, instead of every week, on their regular days.

The surgical dressing department of the branch will meet on Tuesday and Saturday afternoons, with no evening sessions. Eugene has kindly loaned us a few bolts of gauze, or we would have been compelled to close the rooms entirely. President Umphrey is making every effort to secure gauze and other materials necessary, that we may resume our work on full time. Due notice will be given when materials arrive.

This fall in our work will give us an opportunity for gardening, house-cleaning and spring sewing. Let us make haste and be ready for all emergency calls when materials are obtained.

Remember our big drive is on and special orders may be expected in all departments.
