OUR GUESS ON GOVERNORSHIP.

It is becoming quite the fashion for newspapers to guess on the outcome of the governorship contest. The Sentinel is gratified that the number of papers who name Moser as one of the three leading candidates is increasing. Moser was not taken seriously for a long time by many, but while they left him alone he was steadily making inroads on the vote until they woke up to the realization that he must be reckoned among the three that will be in the lead. While there seems to be considerable unanimity of opinion that Moser, Withycombe and Olcott will be the three leaders, there is some difference of opinion as to which will hold first position. Withycombe has unquestionably gained considerable strength within the past few weeks, but The Sentinel's guess is that the result so far is merely to give the governor a lead over Olcott, who seems to have slipped a little. The Sentinel still concedes Moser first place, with Withycombe, whom we formerly placed third, now in second place and Olcott third.

The Sentinel makes this guess without prejudice against our present governor, even though he did promise four years ago to get out of Moser's way this time. It seems to be conceded that in politics a man has a right to change his mind on such a promise.

Ralph Williams, of Portland, national republican committeeman for Oregon, has announced his candidacy for re-nomination for that position. Mr. Williams has served well in that capacity and has lent his efforts towards harmonizing the different factions of the party. He has done so well along this line that he has the united support of the progressive wing of the party in his present candidacy. There are no emoluments connected with the office and when a man of Mr. Williams' ability and attainments is willing to serve, the voters should give him the opportunity to do so. He is especially qualified for the position at this time when the harmonizing of all factions of a party is the first move in harmonizing all parties in support of the government.

RED CROSS NOTES.

There seems to be some misunderstanding as to the proceeds of store and millinery department. All proceeds from these departments are turned over to the secretary and become a part of the general fund. All departments, including the west side and east side sewing rooms, surgical dressing rooms and auxiliaries receive their portion of materials bought from the general fund. As there are no overhead expenses in either of these departments all proceeds go to the general fund. Rooms, lights, phone, drayage, wood, machines and help are all donated. If anyone has a surplus of canned fruit, books, dishes, fancy work, shoes or clothing they will be gladly accepted. The proceeds of these two departments total a fraction over \$150 since February 8. No article can be accepted with a percentage deducted. All superfluous articles of no value to you will bring cash to the general fund and the workers of these departments will guarantee to dispose of these articles in 30 days and add the receipts to our fund for the purchase of materials for emergencies.
