Swinging Bridge donations flowing in to fix landmark

As the warmer temperatures hit Cottage Grove, locals are beginning to miss an old friend.

The Swinging Bridge is a childhood memory for many and a new destination in the city for others but currently, it's a headache for city admin-

The bridge was deemed unsafe late last year after the city engineer revealed elements of the bridge had begun to fail. As a result, the city closed the bridge to the public and began the process of researching what it would take to fix it.

During a city council meeting in March, city engineer Ron Bradsby revealed that the board had three options to repair the bridge and all of them reached into the hundred of thousands of dollars. Hearing the figures sent residents into action.

The Friends of the Swinging Bridge, a social media group, quickly formed to begin exploring fundraising options. It has since appeared at community events such as Earth Day in Coiner Park to spark the public to donate to the cause.

The group's efforts paid off recently when the city announced it would allow residents to round up their water bills to donate to the bridge's repair.

So far, the fundraising effort has raised

The bridge is also eligible for a \$150,000 grant through the Oregon Parks and Recreational Trails grant program. The cost of the bridge's repair, however, soar above that.

At the March 27 meeting of the city council, Bradsby and Meyers laid out the options to the

"The first option is an ugly, off the truck bridge,"

Cottage Grove City Manager Richard Meyers told council. The cost of the pre-fabricated replacement bridge clocked in at around \$370,000.

Option two would cost roughly \$261,000 but would maintain some movement in the bridge. However, according to Bradsby, the recommendation for the second option would create a bridge that did not meet current

"Basically, the option is using the existing bridge and replacing the aspects that have failed like the upper cables and the decking," Bradsby told

The Sentinel. While the replacements would enable the to bridge to swing, OBEC reported that it would exceed the 50 pounds per lineal foot safety standard. Option three was a combination of one and two.

Eventually, the board opted to pursue option number two, noting the community's desire to maintain the bridge's ability to swing and its current style.

Williams was born and raised in Ev-


erett, Washington but has been a staple in the Cottage Grove community for decades. He worked for 37 years for Wey-


He is a past recipient of the Chamber's First Citizen and Distinguished Service Awards and currently serves as Vice President of the BMD Heritage Association.
