# Local senior and disability office closing

 downtown Cottage Grov office in closing its doors. The move comes after the office cut its hours of operation in May of this year. According to Jody Cline, director of Senior and Disability Services, the closure is the result of a budget decision."We have a mix of funding but primarily it comes from the state," she said. "It was essentially the same problem that the state of Oregon was having with its budget. Expenses were rising faster than money was coming in."
Residents who use the office will have to travel to Creswell, though the exact date of the transition is still unknown according to Cline. The group has yet to sign the lease on the new facility in Creswell, but Cline noted that despite the uncertainty, the facility does not expect a disruption of service.
The office reportedly attempted to relocate within Cottage Grove but could not find a suitable office space. Cline did note that transportation was taken into account and the facility will be looking into transportation options for Cottage Grove residents.
"But people do not always have to come in," she said. "Some of our case workers go to the person and that is something we will continue doing."
Cline also noted that the new location in Creswell is smaller than the current space because the facility is downsizing.
"No one is being laid off but some people will be located in Eugene," she said. "The Creswell office will have fewer staff than we did in Cottage Grove," she said Senior and Disability Services is a division of Lane Council of Governments. For more information, please call (541) 682-7800.

was House Bill 3030. The legislave appearance at the legislature Kate Brown last month, prohibited the sale of nitrous oxide can isters to individuals under the age of 18 . The effort to impose the law began with local resident Karen Munsell and the city's Youth Advisory Council (YAC). Both Munsell and YAC made the trip to Salem to speak before the legislature on the harmful effects of the canisters on youths who inhale the nitrous.
Other changes accomplishments of the 2017 Legislative Session included:

A balanced budget. The chambers came together at the start of the session with a gap in the budget that threatened education, health and safety funding. By the end of the session, the state's lawmakers were able to balance the books and turn in a nearly $\$ 21$ billion budget
Concerns over the state's readiness in the face of the coming Cascadia Quake as well as an aging and failing infrastructure
