Cottage Grove half-marathon injury update

During the April 7 running of the Cottage Grove half-marathon, a Eugene woman suffered life-threatening injuries.

Melissa Beckwith, a 50 year-old oncologist that lives in Eugene, was critically injured after the unusually high winds blew a tree onto the Row River Trail and struck her.

According to a page on gogetfunding.com, the details of the race are hazy.

"She remembers she made it 10 miles during a storm with high winds. She doesn't remember what happened next," the post begins. The post goes on to inform that Beckwith suffered a fractured skull and neck and had "severe bleeding and swelling of her brain."

An emergency craniotomy stopped the bleeding and saved her life.

Her page notes that she was able to return home over the weekend and is currently undergoing rehab.

North Douglas falls to top 3A team

While numbers never lie, they still can deceive.

As was the case as North Douglas lost at home last Wednesday in a non-league game 10-0 to a Scio team that is currently ranked third in the state at the 3A level.

"If we play with this much fire and desire against teams in our league, we're going to be alright. We'll definitely be in the hunt at the end of the year. Because we've got some skills, we did great and we showed it tonight. We really did," said North Douglas head coach Jesse Rice. "And like you said, the score isn't representative of how they played. They really played well."

Playing without several starters, the defending state champions, North Douglas, sent Whitney Anderson, who joined the team via a co-op with Crow, to the pitching circle.

"She... hasn't pitched in a couple years and stepped right up and she really did well," said Rice. "I said, 'Hey, good to see ya' and she goes, 'What are you talking about?' 'You get to pitch today.'"

And she was like 'No!' But she did great."

Scio has been an offensive power all year and have scored the second most runs in 3A this season along with scoring 20 runs in six games. The team's firepower was on display in the first inning when Brooke Young hit a solo homerun over the left field fence. In the second inning, the Loggers continued to get on base and had four of their 15 hits in the inning but came away with just one run.

The Warriors kept the game close defensively, but were not able to manufacture any runs.

"We got some hits. We didn't capitalize on them but we left a bunch of runners on. Couldn't coordinate those hits like we wanted to but just the fact that we were hitting that pitcher, to us, is a great thing," said Rice.

As Scio took a 4-0 lead heading into the seventh inning, they then turned it on as they recorded five runs and six runs in the inning.

"Taking them to the seventh inning at 4-0 is a victory in my book. I tell you. We kind of fell apart in that last inning," said Rice.

Last Thursday the Warriors travelled to Oakridge where they won 24-8 to move to 6-0 in league play. The team is now ranked sixth in the 2A/1A combined classification.
