Peggy's Primary Connection gets permanent home

Ana Maria Dudley told them she couldn't do it.

She couldn't stand in front of a crowd made up of teachers, school administrators and community supporters and talk about how thrilled she was to have a new, permanent home for the family resource center in Cottage

There was no way.

But on Thursday, Sept. 20, shielding her eyes from the sun, with tears on her voice, she took to the podium and thanked her friend Peggy.

"I remember 28 years ago when Peggy came to us with this idea," said Sherry-Duerst Higgins, the longest-serving member currently seated on the South Lane School Board. "We supported it and I remember when the first classes were held at the district office."

Those classes — parenting classes, early childhood classes, teen parenting classes — were part of what became Peggy's Primary Connection, a gem in the South Lane School District that worked to establish early ties to community and provide a resource for parents and children.

And until this year, it was doing it without a home of its own.

Peggy's Primary Connection moved out of the district offices but managed to ping-pong around the district and, according to several speakers on Thursday, never knew where it would land next.

In 2016, voters approved a \$35 million bond for upgraded security and technology around the school district as well as the construction of a new elemen-

tary school, a revamp of the community pool and a permanent home for the dis-

The new building provides offices for staff, an outdoor playground and more space for programs and services including parent education, early education, HeadStart, homework help, jobs proinsurance and medical care. "Peggy's Primary Con-

nection is not just a place," said Jackie Lester, the P-20 outreach coordinator based at the new center. "It's a concept that we take out into the community. We meet them where they are."

It was a sentiment echoed throughout the day with several community partners attending the ribbon-cutting ceremony and one word floating out from the chatter just prior to the grand opening: "Happy."

"We're so happy for you."

"The kids will be so hap-

"I'm so happy this is happening."


And despite her tears and halting speech stopped now and then by emotion, Dudley was happy too. She talked

"Today," Dudley said, "Peggy's dream is now a reality."

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






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
