inclusion of the BMX track as a potential project for the space is not an endorsement for the project. Planning's Eric Mongan invited Blitz, along with the rest of the public, to the charrette as a community member who had an idea for the nature park.

It doesn't mean the track, which fell into disrepair after the BMX program left town, will not find its way back to Cottage Grove.

The class, made up of 70 students, must turn in 10 proposals each to earn credit at the university.

"That's 700 proposals, it could be anything," Mongan said.

According to the website managed by the planning class, several ideas popped up during the charrette including connecting bike trails into a larger network, constructing a bus stop and providing bike racks and maintenance stations. The class ranked the ideas according to priority and included sections ranging from bike paths to gardens to recreation and education.
