# Fire Crew Quickly Extinguishes Small Fire On Grant Ave.

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South Lane County Fire and Rescue (SLCFR) responded to a house fire on Grant Avenue in Cottage Grove last Thursday afternoon. According to

officials, they believe a faulty ceiling fan in an upstairs bathroom was responsible for the blaze, which caused minor damage to the home. Residents were in the home at the time of the fire but safely evacuated the premises.

"On our arrival, we saw

light to moderate smoke coming from the eaves of the second story of the house," said SLCFR Division Chief Aaron Smith, who was on the scene. "We were able to make entry, go offensive and fight the seed of the fire and extinguish the fire within seconds."

Two engines and two medic units responded to the fire.

Smith noted that fires started by ceiling fans are not uncommon. "Those ceiling fans have caused the fire service problems for a number of years. Those things they need to be maintained," said Smith.
